We asked. You answered. And changes are coming!

We are excited to share with you several of the branding updates and communications changes starting to take place as a result of extensive marketing and communications research and analysis funded by our OnBoard matching grant.

Your generous donations, which doubled the value of the OnBoard grant awarded in 2022, allowed us to hire two outside firms to assist in this process. Thank you! A communications strategy firm out of Austin began work in early 2023 alongside temple's Communications Task Force to analyze our current content, interview members and staff, and research best practices. They developed our new strategy and created guidelines for communications and processes which were presented to and accepted by the Board.

In late 2023, a different marketing group was hired to finesse our brand and begin design and implementation. Work has begun on new templates, our new website, and a new look for Temple Shalom to take us into our next 60 years. Here is an update:

COMMUNICATION PILLARS. To better organize our communications, we have developed four communications pillars to which most activities and events will be assigned. Starting this fall, our weekly e-mails will be organized by pillar with quick links and less "clutter".

I Was Just Thinking...

Perhaps many of you saw the story in the news or even the smoke in the air, of the tragic fire at First Baptist Church of Dallas, that destroyed its century old sanctuary. Thankfully, no one was hurt. The headline in the paper the following days was, "The Church is more than a building". I couldn't agree more. It gave me pause to think about our Temple Shalom community and the elements that make it possible to withstand decades of headwinds and difficulties, I have come to appreciate more than ever, the key historic, transcendent and holy ingredients that make a Temple like ours so special.

Synagogues are not merely physical structures but sanctuaries that embody the essence of community, spirituality, and human connection. August 2024/Av 5784 - Endings & New Beginnings



June and July are behind us. It's August and back-to-school time. Yet, the summer is far from over—at least based on the heat index. I enjoy the feeling back-to-school evokes. It's a milestone for a new year, new classmates, new subjects and supplies, and of course, back-to-school clothes. For parents of K through high schoolers, it's a change from relaxed summers to busy carpool schedules mixed with the excitement of our children learning and experiencing new things. As a parent of a college student, I will miss my daughter after having her home for the summer, but I am excited for her to begin a new year. At Temple Shalom, we celebrate August with a new religious school term, Back to School Blessing, and several other special programs.

It's also the month of Av, a time of contrasts where the Jewish people lament destruction and are promised renewal. As Jews, we intentionally experience both sadness and joy during this time.

On the 9th of Av, we observe Tisha B'Av, the annual fast day in Judaism. We lament several disasters in Jewish history, including the destruction of both Temples, the First Crusade with killings and expulsions, and many other tragedies over the centuries. After fasting and lamenting our people's suffering, less than a week later, we celebrate Tu B'Av - the Jewish Day of Love and Rebirth. The Gemara suggests that Tu B'Av was the day the "tribes of Israel were permitted to mingle with each other" and to marry from other tribes (Talmud, Ta'anit 30b). Another suggestion is that Tu B'Av was the beginning of the grape harvest during the Second Temple period. Today in Israel, Tu B'Av is a day of love (ahava) celebrated similarly to Valentine's Day.

As I look forward to the crisp, cool air of Autumn and the High Holy Days, I also plan to "live in the moment" during August/Av, lamenting losses and celebrating opportunities for new beginnings.

Each month, we will be introducing you to the members of the Temple Shalom Board of Trustees. Each of them will be telling us about their personal Jewish Journey.



My Jewish Journey began long before I was born. It began many generations ago during the Austro-Hungarian Empire. I am a first-generation American-born child of Holocaust survivors. I am both bi-lingual and bi-cultural.

My mother, together with her parents and younger brother, arrived in Allentown, PA in 1939 as the first Jewish refugee family after surviving under Hitler's rule for one year.

My father, who arrived in the United States in 1938, spoke very little of his survival story. He would say, "Some things are better left unsaid."

Large, extended families have always been a source of envy for me. My maternal grandmother was one of six siblings, four sisters and two brothers. All but one were married with children. My grandmother was the sole survivor.

My parents met in Detroit, Michigan while my mother was visiting and my father was the lone bachelor in the poker group. Six weeks later they were engaged and soon after, were married.

My brother and I were raised in a kosher home and went to Hebrew school where my grandfather was the Baal Koreh. This meant he was qualified to read from the Torah, and helped conduct Services. He also taught the Bar Mitzvah classes and was respectfully known as "Reverend Schey". This was the same position he held in the main Synagogue in Vienna before it was burned to the ground during "Kristallnacht" on November 9, 1938.

My Jewish spirit runs strong and true because I stand on the shoulders of those who came before me. I tell their story because they cannot.

In 1967, I married my high school sweetheart and one month later, the U.S. Air Force sent us to Abilene, Texas. We were welcomed by the twenty-five Jewish families of Temple Mitzpah and there we made our decision to remain in Texas. After approximately two years of service, we and our newborn son came to Dallas and Temple Shalom.

When my amazing daughter made the decision to become a "single-mom-by-choice" at the age of 38, she went to speak with my mother first. As my beautiful mother listened to my daughter, she became solemn for a moment, then she said in a soft voice, "When I think of all the babies in our family who never got to grow up...each child born of my progeny is a slap in the face of those who would annihilate us.

"I WANT TO START HER COLLEGE FUND!"

So, after three generations of lifecycle events here in Temple Shalom, my Jewish journey continues.

Like many others at Temple Shalom, my family and I chose to become members because of the sense of belonging that fellow members and Rabbi Paley create all around us. As someone who has recently joined the Board of Trustees, I wanted to shed some light on my Jewish Journey to this point:

Some of my earliest memories were centered around Jewish holidays and experiences. Whether it was Passover Seders, Chanukah Parties, Sunday school arts and crafts, or JCC Camps/Sports, my Jewish journey started early and persisted throughout my childhood. Growing up, my family was part of Anshai Emet which later merged and became Anshai Torah in Plano. My family kept kosher in our home and was frequent attendees at Friday/Saturday services. As previously mentioned, I participated in JCC activities including pre-school, camps, sports, and BBYO throughout my childhood and teenage years. At Anshai, I participated in religious school, had a bar

mitzvah and went through confirmation.

One of the more formative experiences during my teenage years was when I went on the March of the Living with BBYO. This trip had us confront our people's history and celebrate our current State (Israel). Starting with a week in Poland, we visited numerous concentration camps and witnessed firsthand the remnants of the atrocities committed against our people. This experience included the observation of Yom HaShoah in Auschwitz/Birkenau. Following that harrowing week, we went to Israel to understand how far our people have come since. We observed Yom Hazikaron and celebrated Yom Ha'atzmaut on back-to-back days in Jerusalem. I also turned 18 in Tel Aviv later that week so, as you might expect, the impact of this trip really shaped my Jewish Pride and understanding as I went off to college.

In college I continued my journey at UT Austin by joining a Jewish fraternity (AEPi) and being a semiactive member at Hillel. Like most people, college was a transformative time educationally, socially, and for me it also gave me a good opportunity to understand what my personal religious beliefs really were. As someone who grew up in a Conservative synagogue, I was taught a very specific mindset of what being Jewish meant, what our history was, and how practicing Judaism "should be done". As I progressed through college, my personal set of beliefs started to drift away from the Conservative movement and became much more aligned with the Reform movement's openness to change, inclusivity, and overall progressiveness towards what a Jewish life looks like and is comprised of.

After graduating, I moved back to Dallas but was unaffiliated until my fiancé (now wife) and I found Temple Shalom. We joined Temple Shalom in 2021, Rabbi Paley married us in early 2022 and we haven't looked back. My family is comprised of my wife Brooke, daughter Clara, and our foster (and maybe future) son. Since joining we have been an active part of the young adult group and have really enjoyed the early childhood education opportunities (especially Munchkin Minyan/Music classes) that are available for our children.



Finding peace & healing together

Letter from The English Learners' Classroom & Garden

In June, Temple's English Language Learners gathered in our classroom garden to harvest the potatoes and onions sown in the cold and rain of February. Our English lesson together focused on telling the story of planting, and harvesting.

Children participated, weighing produce and participating in a literacy game with their parents.

Over the next weeks, volunteers added new plants to students' garden beds: Indian Snake cucumbers, many different kinds of eggplant (the centerpieces from the Sisterhood Women of Valor event), okra, sweet potatoes, peppers, tomatoes, and melons!

Teacher-volunteers have begun distributing the weekly harvest through home visits. Our students participate in classroom community meetings to discuss the harvests, what they receive, colors, textures and how they prepare the food, recipes, and the meals they share with their families.

Cucumbers during the hot summer provide nutrients, hydration, and digestive health benefits, our students report. They make a traditional Afghan (and Persian) drink called "doogh" with their cucumbers. The children are also enjoying cucumbers sprinkled with a little salt! Delicious!

Our students send their appreciation and best wishes to Temple Shalom, and thank everyone for their kindness.

Once a report is made, security agents determine the urgency and, if necessary, work with the FBI or other law enforcement partners. The information from the reports can also be used to keep better data on incidents, learn who is behind the threats, and track cases across communities. People can use their computers, tablets or cell phone to fill out the reports.

Luma Mufleh is the inspirational coach of the soccer team Fugees – short for refugees. An immigrant from Jordan, Luma founded the team for immigrants in the summer of 2004 and quickly realized that the needs of this particular team were going to be unique. In addition to the challenges faced by every pre-teen and teenager, these players were dealing with posttraumatic stress issues, language barriers, cultural disconnects and devastating poverty as their economic reality. Luma empowered the players to use their voices to reclaim and tell their own stories. In 2006, she founded Fugees Family, the only network of schools in the U.S. dedicated to refugee and immigrant education. It brings together diverse cultures and customs while working to prepare students to build the better life they have only dreamed of.
