

I Was Just Thinking...



Patriot Day was officially established by a joint resolution of the U.S. Congress on December 18, 2001, and signed into law by President George W. Bush. This day is dedicated to the memory of the victims of the September 11 attacks, the bravery of first responders, and the resilience of survivors and their families. At 8:46 AM, the time when the first plane struck the North Tower of the World Trade Center, Americans are encouraged to observe a moment of silence, reflecting on the profound loss and the unity that emerged in the wake of tragedy.

Beyond its immediate commemorative purpose, Patriot Day has evolved into a day for reflecting on the broader implications of 9/11 and the enduring significance of patriotism. The attacks were not only an assault on the United States but also on the principles of liberty, equality, and justice that define the nation. Patriot Day serves as a reminder that these values must be vigilantly defended and preserved, even in the face of adversity.

Patriotism is often understood as loyalty to one's country, but it encompasses a deeper commitment to the ideals and values that define a nation. For Americans, these values include freedom, democracy, and the inherent dignity and worth of every individual. From a Jewish perspective, patriotism is not merely about allegiance to a nation but also about fulfilling one's ethical responsibilities as a member of a community.

The Hebrew Bible repeatedly calls for the protection of the vulnerable, the pursuit of justice, and the establishment of a just society. These principles align with the broader American ideals of equality and freedom, suggesting that true patriotism involves a commitment to creating a just and inclusive society for all.

In today's world, being a patriot means more than just loyalty to one's country; it involves a commitment to the ideals of freedom, democracy, and justice. From both an American and a Jewish perspective, patriotism requires active engagement in the democratic process—whether through voting, civic participation, or advocating for policies that promote justice and equality. A patriot is someone who speaks out against injustice, challenges the status quo when necessary, and works to build a better society for all its members.

Patriotism also involves embracing diversity and understanding that a nation's strength lies in its ability to unite people of different backgrounds, beliefs, and cultures. The United States, like the Jewish community, is made up of diverse individuals whose collective contributions enrich the whole. A true patriot recognizes that the values of freedom and equality apply to everyone, regardless of race, religion, or ethnicity, and works to ensure that these values are upheld.

Patriot Day is a day of remembrance, reflection, and reaffirmation of the values that define the United States. It is a time to honor the victims of September 11, 2001, and to recognize the bravery and resilience of those who responded to the attacks. It is also a time to consider what it means to be a patriot—both from an American perspective and through the lens of Jewish ethical teachings. True patriotism involves a deep commitment to the principles of freedom, democracy, and justice, as well as a willingness to stand up for these values, even in the face of adversity. As we observe Patriot Day, let us recommit ourselves to these ideals, guided by the teachings of our diverse traditions, and work together to build a more united, just, and inclusive nation.

Dear Temple Family,

The Temple Shalom Board of Directors and several committees have been busy working on several projects I wanted to inform you about.

A New Security Fence:

The Security Fence Committee includes Stephanie Hirsh (Chair), Barry Epstein, Marshall Funk, Joel Guskin, Mike Hochman, Bob Landers, Phil Rosenfeld, and David Lamden. Temple Shalom received a \$150,000 Homeland Security Grant to pay for a security fence around the perimeter of Temple Shalom. The committee thoroughly researched

commercial fencing types, companies, prices, federal/state requirements, and potential fence locations. They sent out an RFP to several commercial fencing companies, checked references, and selected a contractor to build an 8ft tall security fence around the perimeter of our land to protect Temple Shalom. A wrought iron fence will be installed along Alpha and Hillcrest. The east and south sides will have an 8ft tall chain link fence. There will also be two electronic gates. The actual cost of the security fence is between \$250,000 – \$300,000. The Board and committee are considering options to fund the additional \$100,000 - \$150,000 required to secure the property properly. The next steps include a meeting with the City of Dallas Zoning Commission in October for approval. The fence is anticipated to be installed by the end of 2024.

Updated Governance Policies:

As a part of the Legacy Heritage Fund's OnBoard Capacity Matching Grant Program, Temple Shalom received funds to hire consultant Cindy Moskowitz to guide us through a review of Temple Shalom's Governance Policies. The committee included Stephanie Hirsh (Chair), Steve Enda, David Gerber, Noel Rigley, Mollie Schick, Bill Siegel, Debbi Sorrentino, Mark Stromberg, Ex-officio: Theresa Myers, Rabbi Andrew Paley, and David Lamden. The committee developed a Governance Task Force Report for Review and adoption by the Board. The scope also included establishing a path for a board policy audit that would include identifying opportunities for new and revised policies and a schedule for board engagement. The Board of Trustees will follow up on the Governance Task Force's recommendations and take appropriate action throughout the year.

Blueprint 2030:

The Board of Trustees is embarking on Blueprint 2030 using another portion of our OnBoard Capacity Matching Grant Program. Rabbi Paley and Stephanie Hirsh will facilitate the process. We have sent an RFP to a small group of highly recommended consultants to support the work, particularly the SWOT analysis. While we plan for the future, the Board also selected three top priorities as its focus for this year during its summer retreat.

Membership Growth & Retention Increase the Endowment so we can support growth Create a new strategic plan

Endowment Committee:

Under the leadership of past president Dennis Eichelbaum, an Endowment Committee was established in conjunction with our 60th Anniversary. One goal is to increase the endowment to \$10 million. The chairs include Mike Hirsh, Rodney Schlosser, Raelaine Radnitz, and David Lamden. A cabinet is in the process of being established. As mentioned in Blueprint 2030, we seek to increase our endowment to support Temple Shalom's future growth. More information to come!

We are super excited about all the great work being performed at the Board and Committee levels. We hope you are as excited about these projects as we are. If you want to help with any of the items listed above, please don't hesitate to reach out and let me know.

Each month, we will be introducing you to the members of the Temple Shalom Board of Trustees. Each of them will be telling us about their personal Jewish Journey.



In the mid-1960s, a public school teacher in Queens was set up on a blind date with an aerospace engineer living in Manhattan. It was arranged by two sisters, who connected them because the teacher and engineer were the only Jewish people the sisters knew. I don't know how that's possible in New York City, but legend is legend. Those were my parents.

I was born in Chicago but moved to Toledo, Ohio, before the age of two. Toledo is a rust belt city of about 250,000 people. It sits on the Ohio-Michigan border and the southeastern end of Lake Erie. Jeep, Champion Spark Plug, and fiberglass giants Owens Corning and Owings Illinois call Toledo home. The city's fortunes rose and fell along with the big three U.S. automakers in Detroit.

When you grow up in Toledo, you feel an automatic kinship with other Jewish people, because there just aren't that many. Three synagogues - one each Reform, Conservative, Orthodox. The only time I remember encountering much antisemitism was when I spent my junior year of high school in Toulouse, France, but those episodes paled in comparison to the pervasive and entirely socially acceptable anti-Arab, anti-Muslim sentiment I witnessed at the time.

Counting college and medical school, I spent eight years in the Northeast, including four in New York City. Maybe times had changed since those sisters had introduced my parents, but there were other Jewish people everywhere I looked. Being Jewish no longer triggered an automatic sense of connection.

Lara Johnson and I met through her best friend in 2001 and were married in 2005. At the time, no synagogue in the city would perform an interfaith marriage. The wedding was held in the Belo Mansion downtown, with the ceremony performed by a part-time rabbi/part-time sheriff.

We were introduced to Temple Shalom through my cousins, Joyce and Howard Korn, their daughter Cathy Feldman, and her family. We joined the synagogue as our kids reached the age of religious school and remained relatively uninvolved members for years. It was when Allie and Cub were preparing to become B'nai Mitzvah that I shared with Rabbi Paley my concerns that they seemed to have no community with the other students. I still remembered my Sunday School buddies from decades before, but my kids could barely name any of their classmates.

Hearing that concern, Rabbi P. suggested I speak with Debbie Niederman about her Youth Commission, which led to my serving on the Lifelong Learning Council and, starting three years ago, the Temple Board.


As for my kids who seemed minimally connected to our community just three years ago? They're now diehard Next *Dor* members, my son an Ozer who would not miss a Sunday morning for anything, my daughter an editor for the national *J Girls* magazine. They both attended the L'Taken Social Justice Seminar run by the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism in Washington, DC, last February.

My daughter Allie, now age 15, recently asked me what I liked most about being Jewish. We were sitting at Forest and Hillcrest, waiting through the third traffic cycle to make a left turn on a weekday morning. "I think I like being part of something small, something a little different," I said. "It's a little bit like being left-handed. I feel like it matters that I represent it."

If any of you have met Allie, you won't be surprised to hear that she immediately responded, "But there are other small religious groups, like Jehovah's Witnesses."

I thought again for a minute and told her that it must be more than the size of the group, but also what it stands for. It's the deep history of liberal intellectualism, seeking justice, and freely speaking one's mind. It's Ruth Bader Ginsberg, Albert Einstein, Howard Stern, Sarah Silverman, Peter Segal, Gloria Steinem, and Jon Stewart. It's an honor to be among them.

Our daughter was born in 1989. We were committed to raising Kelly as a Jew, and by that time I was considering conversion to Judaism. I was already ensconced in Jewish culture with Don's family and with lots of Jewish friends in Dallas. Now it was time to make it official. I wanted to participate fully as Jew in our family, so I converted. I became a Jew!

My mother-in-law, Rae Carafiol, of blessed memory, said to me that I should get involved in the Sisterhood. She had always been active in her Sisterhood in St. Louis, and she said this is where I would make lots of friends. I thought that was a great idea, so I joined Sisterhood.

When Kelly was born, I was a stay-at-home mom, and have always been grateful for that opportunity. Being a mother is the most important job I've ever had! In those days I was ripe to get involved in community activities because I was looking for something else meaningful to add to my roles as wife and mother. I was also wanting to know more about how to be Jewish and wanting to have spiritual experiences with my fellow Jews.

I met Faye Spiegel not long after converting to Judaism. Faye and I quickly became best girlfriends, and still are to this day. When we first met, she was so excited about Temple Shalom Sisterhood and was on track to be the Sisterhood president in a couple of years. I told her I wanted to get involved, and quickly she got me a position on the Sisterhood board.

A lot of people don't care to go to board meetings, but I loved it! I felt like our work was important. I liked the other ladies. Jacque Prager was the president, and I could see myself following in her footsteps, with Faye.

Lenora Hausman saw my potential. She asked me to join Temple Shalom Sisterhood as a delegate to the WRJ District 22 convention in Tulsa. Fun! We were going to a sleepover! We did have fun, and that weekend I learned about the super important work of the Women of Reform Judaism. I was on fire! I was ready to do something meaningful, and Sisterhood and WRJ were offering me the opportunity. I went for it.

Fast forward - - I served as Sisterhood President from 1997-1999 (right after Faye was president). My mother-in-law and other Jewish friends spoke with such reverence and respect for the Sisterhood presidents they knew, and this was a factor in my desire to serve. I was ready for leadership and personal growth and new friends. Everything came together so beautifully, and I am so glad to have made the choice to not only be Jewish, but to be actively involved in the Temple Shalom community.

I have stayed involved with our Sisterhood through the years and am currently serving as the Sisterhood Social Justice VP. More recently, I was asked to serve on the Temple board and am grateful to be part of this awesome group.

My grandmother used to say to me, "All that you put into the lives of others comes back into your own". Temple Shalom, my Jewish faith and identity, Sisterhood, and Jewish friends and family have shaped my life in a way that makes me happy. My values are aligned with these things. My Jewish life is very meaningful to me, and I'm glad I put a lot into it!

What is "Reverse Tashlich?" Reverse Tashlich is an innovative environmental practice that re-imagines the traditional Jewish ritual of Tashlich to confront the modern issue of pollution. Tashlich, traditionally observed during the High Holy Days, involves symbolically casting away sins or transgressions into a body of water, seeking forgiveness and a fresh start for the upcoming year. In Reverse Tashlich, the symbolism is transformed to address a contemporary environmental concern—plastic and marine debris pollution. Instead of casting away sins, participants come together to remove these harmful pollutants from the water: we want to keep waste from entering our waterways, fostering a sense of responsibility and stewardship for the environment.

All around the country - and world - on September 29, Jewish organizations will be participating in this Reverse Tashlich movement to repair our seas and environment.



As we engage in creative activities, whether through collaborative projects, communal gathering and worship, our new Family Cooking Club, or time spent in the garden, we strengthen the bonds of **friendship** and cultivate a supportive, inclusive environment where everyone feels valued and inspired.

We believe that community is sacred. Temple Shalom Religious School is a place where we come together to support one another, to grow, and to celebrate life's ups and downs. Each week when we gather in **Holy Community**, we reinforce the power and importance of being together. By focusing on art and creativity throughout the 5785 year, we will enrich our communal life, together creating spaces where beauty is revealed and hope is nurtured. Together we will continue to build a holy community that is vibrant, resilient, and filled with creativity; rich in **friendship** and filled with wonder and **joyful** purpose.





Once a report is made, security agents determine the urgency and, if necessary, work with the FBI or other law enforcement partners. The information from the reports can also be used to keep better data on incidents, learn who is behind the threats, and track cases across communities. People can use their computers, tablets or cell phone to fill out the reports.

Luma Mufleh is the inspirational coach of the soccer team Fugees – short for refugees. An immigrant from Jordan, Luma founded the team for immigrants in the summer of 2004 and quickly realized that the needs of this particular team were going to be unique. In addition to the challenges faced by every pre-teen and teenager, these players were dealing with posttraumatic stress issues, language barriers, cultural disconnects and devastating poverty as their economic reality. Luma empowered the players to use their voices to reclaim and tell their own stories. In 2006, she founded Fugees Family, the only network of schools in the U.S. dedicated to refugee and immigrant education. It brings together diverse cultures and customs while working to prepare students to build the better life they have only dreamed of.

History Highlights: Operation LUSTY

During World War II, U.S. intelligence teams played a key role by gathering actionable intelligence, including information on enemy aircraft, weapons, and war-related research. In April 1945, Operation LUSTY ("Luftwaffe Secret Technology") was enacted by the U.S. Army Air Forces with the goal of disarming and collecting German aeronautical equipment and technology for study in the United States. Join Dr. Sara Abosch-Jacobson, the Barbara Rabin chief education officer, and Anne Hanisch, project cataloger, as they share more about Operation LUSTY and its wartime intelligence operations through photographs from the William "Pete" Whaley Family Collection, which feature Major Whaley through his service in the U.S. Army Air Forces' 56th Disarmament Squadron from December 1944 to August 1945.
