## *I Was Just Thinking...*



I have to admit it. Every once in a while I find myself gravitating towards that television show, “Man vs. Food” on the travel channel. As someone who definitely enjoys eating out and finding good food to share with family and friends, I am amused by the various dishes and places the show serves up

for its viewers to devour. But with the enjoyment of the show comes the inevitable need for the spiritual Pepto Bismol almost immediately after, as I think to myself, “...is it really necessary or even entertaining to watch a man suffer through eating a 7 pound burrito, or a 4 pound steak?” I can’t help but to feel ashamed at myself and our culture that we would buy into the frenzy.

I suppose on some level, highlighting a city and a restaurant isn’t a bad thing. What is so troubling however is the obvious and gluttonous conspicuous consumption. It is really troubling. And, of course, even worse, in my opinion, is the infamous (my description) International Hotdog Eating Contest sponsored by Nathan’s Hotdogs. I don’t know how many of you have had the displeasure of seeing this (on ESPN no less...) but this is conspicuous consumption at its absolute worst. What is so admirable about who can eat the most hotdogs, bun and all, in the shortest amount of time? I wish it were just contained to hotdogs. According to the Major League Eating/International Federation of Competitive Eating (This is no joke. Check out [www.ifoce.com](http://www.ifoce.com)) there are separate contests to see who can eat the most hotdogs, ice cream, tacos, ribs, tamales, chicken wings, burritos, pickles, Mars bars, oysters and, my personal favorite (sarcasm included), gyozas!

This year, as we usher in a time when all of us at Temple Shalom will be thinking about “Yad b’yad – together we can...” let’s take some extra time to think about how we can, together, do a little bit more for others in our midst. We will facilitate this in part on Yom Kippur, during our symposium, when Colleen Brinkman, Chief Philanthropy Officer for the North Texas Food Bank, will be our special guest and presenter. The North Texas Food Bank is our newest partner in the fight against hunger in North Texas, and our newest partner in bringing the message of

hope and possibility to those in need.

I’d like to believe that Adam Richman, the host of “Man vs. Food” is Jewish. He may very well be. I’d like to believe that his Jewish tradition and teachings guide him to an ethic of not only providing interesting and helpful information, but of helping and feeding. I don’t know if that’s the case. What I

## “Don’t Sweat the Small Stuff”



Let’s face it. The High Holy Days can be stressful. For those with school-age children, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur coincide with the beginning of the school year. The lighter workload of the summer is replaced by the need to buckle down at our jobs. Traffic increases. Sports teams organize. Religious School begins. We are back in the rat race.

Amidst the Back to School Nights and the resumption of volunteer responsibilities come the High Holy Days. While promising spiritual uplift, they are often shrouded by a demanding “to do” list:

- Make the brisket.
- Buy new Temple shoes for the kids.
- Find an outfit to “keep up with the Steins.”
- Negotiate the family gathering.
- Send the High Holy Day cards.
- Does honey have an expiration date?

Then there is Temple time:

- Long services.
- Lengthy sermons.
- Kids fidgeting.
- Dread the fast.
- Confront the guilt.
- Acknowledge how much we missed the mark.

Our prayer books ask “who shall live and who shall die in the coming year?” Many of us are more concerned with how to make it through this hectic Holy Day season! Where is the payoff for the energy we exert and the exhaustion we endure?

Oprah and others chant “don’t sweat the small stuff.” Baseball coaches tell us to “keep our eye on the ball.” We *can* find meaning in the midst of the madness. How? Try out this alternative “to do” list for a spiritually meaningful season:

- Think about your year, the ups and downs. Celebrate the ways you have grown.
- Consider your shortcomings. Figure out how you might bridge the distance between who you are and who you would like to be.
- As the yoga instructor teaches, get rid of the chatter in your head and focus on breathing. Inhale deeply.
- Create space for prayer. Let tradition wind its way into your soul.
- Embrace the new beginning and the possibilities of the New Year.
- Choose age-appropriate prayer experiences for your family. Find a service or more just for yourself.
- Simplify your menu; it will still be delicious.
- Wear comfortable shoes.
- Use Chinette.

## Rites and Passages

### Some Thoughts About *Yizkor*, the Memorial Service



*Yizkor* is the ceremony during which we remember our loved ones who have died. This is not to be confused with the custom of *Yortzeit*, which marks the date when a loved one has passed away and hearing their name read at a *Shabbat* service. *Yizkor* is more than just the recitation of names. It is the public observance for the community of bereaved.

It is a prescribed ritual with certain psalms and liturgy to be said. It carries such importance that some Jews choose to only come to that service during the entire High Holy Day Season. On the other hand, there are some Jews who make sure that their children do **not** stay for *Yizkor*: for if they do and they recite the mystical *kaddish* prayer, they are somehow hastening the day of their parent's deaths. This, of course, is pure superstition.

Originally, *Yizkor* was recited only on *Yom Kippur*. Its primary purpose was to remember the deceased by giving [\*tzedakah\*](#), that is making a monetary donation on the theory that the good deeds of the survivors elevate the souls of the departed. It also raised the chances for personal atonement by doing a deed of loving kindness. It is interesting to note that the text from the traditional *Yizkor* prayer has been altered in our prayer book. Specifically the Hebrew *she-b'li ne-der e-tein zt'-da-kah*, "I pledge to donate charity..." has been removed. Nevertheless, the custom of making a donation to a worthy cause in the name of those who have passed away still remains the custom in Reform practice.

Since the Torah reading on the last day of the holidays of *Sukkot*, *Passover* and *Shavuot*, when the ancient Israelites made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, mentions the importance of donations, *Yizkor* was added to these holiday services.

This year *Yizkor* will be recited on *Yom Kippur* afternoon as well as on Thursday, September 30<sup>th</sup>, the last day of the celebration of *Sukkot*.

I hope many of you will join us for this very moving service.

### Becoming an Ally



In the Dallas Morning News issue dated August 11, it was reported that the United States Department of Education was hosting a conference about bullying and the strategies for dealing with bullying in our schools. This has become a hot topic nationally as we hear more and more horrific outcomes from students bullying one another. This year as the major component of our Religious School teacher orientation, our faculty participated in a special workshop facilitated by the Anti Defamation League and co-sponsored by the Center for Jewish Education entitled "Becoming an Ally: Interrupting Name-calling and Bullying." This workshop provided practical opportunities for our teachers to develop and practice skills to respond to incidents of name-calling and bullying among students. It is our hope to help our students interact appropriately with one another and empower our teachers to help stop these potentially destructive behaviors in order to create a place for our children to feel safe and connected.

On October 3 at 11:00am, we will be offering a parent workshop on this topic and invite anyone who is interested to come acquire parental tools for helping your child cope with these behaviors.

I look forward to working with all of you to nurture the Jewish identity of all of our students in a safe environment.

## Introduction to Judaism Is For Everyone

Register now for Introduction to Judaism. This significant learning experience begins on October 5<sup>th</sup> and will be held on Tuesdays for 24 sessions from 7:00-9:00pm.

Introduction to Judaism is for anyone who wants to fill in gaps in their Jewish knowledge, explore Judaism, or satisfy a requirement for conversion. Rabbi Schneider will be the primary teacher for the class but guest teachers from Temple Shalom's clergy, senior staff, and community leaders will teach as well.






