

## *I Was Just Thinking...*



Jews and Judaism are known for being the people of The Book. And as such, we take the words of The Book seriously, to the extent that we sometimes argue over the meaning and substance of sentences and more often than not, single words. For Jews and Rabbis, semantics is an art form to be embraced. As this is true for clergy and those studying sacred text, so is it true for diplomats and negotiators and policy analysts trying

to figure out the world's issues.

The issue of semantics could not be any more important and dramatic than with the issue related to Iran and its nuclear program and the very real existential threat it poses for Israel. Perhaps some of you have been following the nuances closely and have noted the dichotomy between the American and Israeli positions. According to Defense Secretary Panetta, "The U.S. will never allow Iran to acquire a nuclear weapon. That is a red light for us." Sounds good. Sounds strong. Sounds clear. Except, upon analysis, we have to ask how one might know when that happens and what to do next? The Israeli position is even more complicated. They assert that Iran should not be allowed to acquire nuclear capability. From that vantage point, even before Iran can build a weapon, they must be prevented from getting the information. The problem with that position is that they already have the information. You cannot obliterate human knowledge acquisition. So we are embroiled in a nuclear capability acquisition vs. a nuclear weapons acquisition debate. How should we proceed? What should we do?

In a recent article, Dr. Joseph Blady, former program officer for the Under Secretary of Defense for Policy and senior analyst for the Under Secretary of Defense for Intelligence wrote, "Closing the barn door after the horse has escaped may be futile, but burning down the barn in a fit of pique might be considered an act of lunacy, especially when there is the potential for the horse to come back and bite you in the butt in retribution."

Iran has possessed the technology for separating uranium isotopes for at least six years, and bomb-making can be learned on the Internet. No matter what Israel and the United States do, that bell cannot be unrung. Virus-ing Iranian centrifuges, murdering Iran's nuclear scientists, and bombing installations will unquestionably slow Iran's nuclear program. But if Iran is hell bent on enriching uranium, even on continuing to the development of a bomb, the outcome is inevitable without regime change. We arranged such a change in Iran in 1954. It left a bad smell then, and can only make a bad U.S. image problem in the region worse than it already is. Thus, such a solution could be a serious mistake if the Iranians themselves aren't leading the effort.

Israel's nervousness is understandable. Iran blusters too much and, if it only means half of what it says, Israel should fear for its safety. However, much mitigates against military

action, either by Israel alone, or in consort with the United States.

First, there is Iran's size and population. It has three times as many people as Iraq, and we know what a mess that was. In addition, there is reason to believe that Iranians would coalesce around the government in a time of national peril rather than push for the ouster of the current leaders.

Next, there is the nuclear program itself. It is much more diversified than the Syrian and Iraqi efforts that Israel put out of commission. There is reason to believe that the Iranian government has had North Korean help with tunneling techniques in order to hide installations. The North Koreans are masters of the art of concealment, and need the money.

There is Iran's wealth. The sanctions may be hurting, but there is cheating going on, and we've caught the Iraqis, not very staunch allies after all, as one of the culprits. It appears there are others. This means that Iran is likely to continue having the capital to rebuild anything we blow up.

As for nuclear enrichment, Iran is actually as entitled as is any other nation to pursue the technology, even under the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT). It is Iran's repetitively slimy behavior that has caused much of the rest of the world to oppose and mistrust Iran in the arena of nuclear enrichment.

In a strict sense vis-a-vis the NPT, Israel and the United States probably don't have a leg to stand on.

In the wings are China and Russia. While changeable in their pronouncements, they are not going to help for numerous reasons. This means that the United Nations will be impotent in this issue. Finally, trouble in the Persian Gulf could lead to disruption of a third of the world's oil supply. The price of crude would head toward \$150

-200 a barrel. That is no way to run an economic recovery.

The simplest, and probably most potent, approach would be a policy pronouncement by the United States extending its nuclear umbrella. It should be made unequivocal that we would retaliate decisively (yes, that means even the Big One, if necessary) should Iran or its surrogates use Iranian nuclear material in an attack against another party. No excuse by Iran about stolen or misplaced material would be acceptable, since they were warned not to go there in the first place. This is the "If you play, you pay" rule. We would rely on our increasing skill in fingerprinting nuclear material to discover its origin. Iran would know that it faced becoming a porcelain hole in the ground the day after an event. Its neighbors could take refuge in the American pledge, thus foregoing the need to field their own nukes.

The key to this policy working is the continuing relevance of deterrence. It worked through the Cold War, and it continues to work today. And don't kid yourself; the Iranians aren't crazy. They do not consider Israel's destruction worth their own disappearance. Diplomacy should continue to be the favored path. But the right stick might make the carrot taste a lot better.

## The Evolving Dress Code Dilemma



I'm probably "speaking to the choir" but from my vantage point as an "elder statesman" of the Reform Movement, I have seen a shift in what is considered by adults as acceptable dress for synagogue attendance and synagogue participation.

As a child I was made very aware by my parents what clothes were appropriate for temple: even as a kid I had to wear dress shoes and at least a white shirt and slacks. (I think as an 8 year old I was already in a tie and jacket for the High Holidays.) When I began serving a congregation in New York in the late 70's not much had changed: Men wore ties and jackets, women wore dresses and children had special clothes to come to temple on Shabbat and most holidays but young children attended without ties and jackets. The eyes still opened when women appeared in their finest jewelry and fur coats and hats with ostrich feathers--going a 'little' over the top dressed-up.

On the Union For Reform Judaism's website I found many responses to the question: What is appropriate dress for today's worshiper? Most respondents concur with my practical beliefs on this issue: I am happy just to see people, especially students, come to temple to worship. I might not agree with their choice of dress, but neither do I wish to be the fashion police, barring anyone from coming to pray.

There is still the question of appropriate attire for those who are *participating* in a service. It is part of our tradition that both modesty and non-ostentatious dress are part of what it means to make prayer special. Clothing should not distract from the service, or make congregants feel uncomfortable. A person on the *bima*, whether a *bar/bat mitzvah* or his/her parents, represents the community, and what one wears has symbolic significance: Do you take the holiness of the moment seriously or are you simply making a fashion statement?

To be specific, I suggest dressing similarly to what is expected in our public schools: if you know you are going to be called up to the *bima*, females, be sure your shoulders are covered; skirt and dress length should be no shorter than just above the knee. No cleavage, please. Males should wear at least slacks and a dress shirt, but certainly no jeans, sneakers or tennis shoes.

Families celebrating their children becoming a *bar* or *bat mitzvah* should make their participating guest aware of what is considered appropriate for temple worship. If they want to "dress down" for an evening party, they should consider doing that after the service.



## Constitution Evolution

If you have not yet checked out the Temple's website, please view the section on Constitution Evolution at <http://www.templeshalomdallas.org/p-451.aspx> to see our progress on this issue. The Board of Trustees approved, at its September meeting, proposed amendments to be taken to the congregation for Article II of the constitution. The current constitution and the proposed amendments can be found by clicking [CONSTITUTION](#) or <http://www.templeshalomdallas.org/p-165.aspx>.

We thank you for all your thoughtful comments and input. We hope you will join us for a town hall meeting on **Wednesday, October 10 at 7:30pm in the Epstein Chapel**, when we will be discussing the constitution and other important temple business and initiatives. This month, as we continue the evolution of our constitution, we look at Articles X and XV.

**Article X** addresses how nominations are made for the board of trustees. At this time the only area we are reviewing is Section 6, which reads as follows:

Section 6. Election shall be by secret ballot. If the slate presented by the nominating committee is unopposed, the secretary may be instructed to cast a single ballot for the slate.

For those of you that have attended annual temple meetings when we vote, we typically just approve an uncontested slate by acclamation. In order to make Section 6 clearer, we are proposing the following edit:

*Section 6. Election shall be by secret ballot. If the slate presented by the nominating committee is unopposed, ~~the secretary may be instructed to cast a single ballot for the slate~~ it may be approved by acclamation.*

**Article XV** reads as follows:

### RULES OF ORDER

The rules of procedure at meetings shall be determined by Roberts Rules of Order, latest revised edition. The President shall have the authority to appoint from among the Board of Trustees an individual to serve as parliamentarian of the Board of Trustees.

The difficulty in being a parliamentarian is that one that acts as parliamentarian is not supposed to participate in discussion or vote. In order to permit all trustees to participate and vote, it makes sense to give the president the right to appoint someone from outside (or inside) the board of trustees to act as parliamentarian. Therefore, the only change we are recommending we consider at this time is the following change:

*The rules of procedure at meetings shall be determined by Roberts Rules of Order, latest revised edition. The President shall have the authority to appoint ~~from among the Board of Trustees~~ an individual to serve as parliamentarian of the Board of Trustees.*

We want and need your feedback. Do you like or object to the proposed alternative version/additions? Do you have any grammatical or substantive suggestions for improving either version or a completely different version you would like to propose?



### Talking Tikkun Olam

There are days when I am wearing my hat as the “official shuttle service” of my family when I suddenly hear the sound of my own voice and that voice is nagging my kids to do something. (Or to stop doing something, of course.)

I often am forced to realize that this “Jewish Mother Baritone” voice lacks effectiveness. It is a tone oft repeated but I get more traction with less sometimes, by working side by side and modeling the change I wish to see instead of simply repeating the need for that change over and over --- and over --- again! I admit this isn't easy.

Embracing Tikkun Olam is like this too. We heard in our liturgy during this season how God asks us to examine ourselves and our actions toward those in need. In Isaiah, chapter 58 we heard God's voice: “What are you doing? Is this the fast I asked you to keep? What? You are whining that you can't possibly rise to the task?” God tells us that if we do the work of repairing the world, we will be blessed – that in helping and healing, we will repair our own wounds, we will grow stronger.

How can this possibly be the case? Is the obligation to sacrifice our time so powerful and transformative an effort? Only you can decide, and the Tikkun Olam Council encourages you to try, wherever you would like to begin. We have many paths available to find out what might happen in your life and in your heart - and in our world - if you try.

Highlights for our council in the last months have been a kick-off meeting where Rabbi Paley reminded our devoted team of the prophetic task of Tikkun Olam, of healing and taking a stand with all the power of our Temple Shalom community.

Our sessions include something for everyone – young families, caregivers, those concerned about health, poverty and our future generations.

Council meetings will be announced as well and we'd love to have you join our team as we plan for future commitments.

One day, I hope my kids will have forgotten that I (often) nagged and exhorted them. Instead, I hope they remember the message behind the wheel: Practice. Do something toward wholeness. See what's needed and who is in need. Be a problem solver. Do one thing to help. Bring yourself and your gifts to the task.
