On July 16, 1992, I sat, perhaps like many of you, mesmerized by a story we heard coming out of the Democratic National Convention. The story entitled, "I Still Believe In A Place Called Hope" delivered by then Governor Bill Clinton, rekindled for me the lost sense of purpose and possibility for our country. I believed the story and I believed *in* the story. What I loved most about

the story was the belief that we could become a better country; that we could become a better American family; that we could transcend the negativity, the frustration and

the growing feeling that the special and important role we could play in the world had been diminished.

It's a difficult task, being a beacon of hope and possibility to the world. It's a difficult task being that beacon to us, let

alone to everyone else. The moment we forget our role, the moment we forget our responsibility of bringing that sense of hope to those who need it, is the moment we become just like everyone else. So, I wonder, "Have we really become like everyone else in the world; just one of the 196 countries of the world?"

While the presidential candidates may not necessarily be sensitive to the Jewish calendar, I would like to think that they are pondering this very question as they head not only into primaries, but also into the holiday of Purim. For it is in the story of Purim and in the story of Israel's first king, Saul, that we find the answer to the question, "What happens when we, as a nation, become like everyone else?"

Most commentators understand the Purim story as correcting King Saul's failure to wipe out Amalek. Samuel commands him to wipe out Amalek. King Saul defeats Amalek, yet he shows mercy upon the King of Amalek, Agag, and allows him to live. When Samuel hears this he tells Saul, "God has torn away the Kingship of Israel from you." In comes Mordechai, who is a descendant of Saul. Mordechai does battle with Haman the Agagite, a descendant of King Agag. Mordechai defeats Haman and shows no mercy upon Agag's descendant Haman. Furthermore, the text tells us that in Mordechai's battle the Jews did not touch the booty at all. As most commentators explain, Mordechai fixes the damage done by Saul's sin.

Where Saul could not kill Agag, Mordechai kills Haman; where Saul took the booty of Amalek, Mordechai does not allow the Jews to take the booty of Haman. That is one way to read the story, but it is not the only way.

Perhaps, Mordechai still comes to repair the sin of Saul; but, maybe, it wasn't only the sin of Amalek. Maybe it was a much more fundamental sin. The Jews approach the prophet Samuel and say to him, "Give us a king to judge us like all the nations." Samuel reluctantly agrees. In the end, the Temple is destroyed, the Jews are exiled, and they end up as subjects to Achashverosh, the King in the Purim story. The Jewish people told Samuel, "We want to be just like all the nations." Be careful what you ask for, because this is exactly what they got. They were now

in a secular kingdom being ruled over by a king who was ruler of all the nations. The great mistake that the Jewish people made – the mistake that led to their exile – was that they asked for a king like all of the nations.

Saul is ultimately replaced by David;

Mordechai is also a figure who replaces Saul. In fact, Mordechai is described as *dod* Esther, the uncle of Esther; but the word *dod* (*daled vav daled*) is sometimes spelled exactly the same way as the word David. Mordechai is the David-like savior who has arrived on the scene to replace Saul. He has come to clean up the great mistake of the Jewish people.

Ultimately, Purim is a holiday where we are fixing the sin of wanting our government to be ke-hol ha-govim, like all the nations. We are not like all the nations. We have our own mission and our own responsibilities. We should not judge ourselves by the standards of others. We should not be ke-hol hagoyim, like all the other nations, but or lagoyim, a light onto the nations. The message of Purim is that, as Jews, we have higher responsibilities, and we must hold ourselves to higher standards. As the end of the megillah states, Layehudim haitah orah, From the Jews there was light. Once we root out the desire of being like all the nations, will we be able to bring light to the nations. Or, perhaps, as I pray our candidates might say, "The message of Purim and of this election is to replace the desire of ke-hol hagoyim with the dream of or lagoyim." Frankly, I still believe in a place called Hope...

May this be so and may you and yours have a happy, festive Purim.

What Will You Leave Behind?



One of my favorite stories of Carl Sagan, the famous astronomer and author, is of the postcard he kept on his mirror. The message read: Dear Friend, just a line to let you know that I am alive and kicking and doing grand. It's a treat. The card was signed by a passenger aboard the Titanic and was postmarked a day before it sank in the Atlantic Ocean!

The first time I heard this story, it

reminded me of the saying in *Pirke Avot* that said, "Repent one day before you die!" The rabbis expound on this verse and ask the natural question about how it is possible to know when you are going to die. They answer it in a thoroughly rabbinic way: Since you don't know, treat every day as if it is the last day of your life.

I wonder if they meant it literally. After all, how feasible is it to go around to everyone you speak to every single day and tell them how sorry you were for what you did the day before?! Rather, I think that the rabbis were urging us to live a life of teshuvah – of repentance – taking teshuvah in the pure sense of the word of turning to others with the very best that each of us possesses. It means living the values that we espouse and taking them outside the temple and using them whenever and wherever we turn to another.

This is what I would call the "value laden life." And since we are in the midst of the primaries, once again there is a lot of TV and radio time devoted to what "values" are.

The problem is that one person's values are not another's. One of the manifestations of values that politicians talk about is putting up the Ten Commandments in public schools. One advocate of this value went so far as to suggest that if the Ten Commandments had been put up in Columbine High School, the terrible massacre that took place would never have happened. Apparently he believes that merely reading the words would, by their very nature, deter children from killing other children.

The Torah tells us in the V'ahavta that we are to write the words "upon our hearts." Not upon our walls. Not in our textbooks or in our classrooms. And not in our legislatures and judicial systems. The values we deem to be worthy cannot be forced upon us. They must be taught and practiced in the home, modeled for our children, and inspired by the reality that we can be so much more than we are. Only then, will our values last beyond our lifetime.

We Jews have a long tradition thinking about what we will leave behind when we are gone. To impart the knowledge that we fixed the world a little bit is a gift that we want to share with those who come after us. That will guarantee that we shall be remembered for good.

The Talmud is filled with the words of men and women whose ultimate values are recorded in the context of their dying words. There is Yohanan ben Zakkai who became mortally ill and was visited by his students. They wanted a blessing from him and he said to them, "Fear heaven as you fear man."

"Is that all?" they puzzled. "Are we not obliged to fear God more than we fear man?"

"Indeed we are," answered ben Zakkai, "but I would be content if your fear of God would be only as great as your fear of man. When a person is about to commit a wrong, he hopes no person sees him. If he were equally fearful of God who sees all, he would not sin." And with that, ben Zakkai died.

Our tradition gives a lot of weight to last words like this. We see them as a last chance to impart what we most deeply believe and that honesty makes those words infinitely valuable. So much so that our Sages tried to preserve as many last words as they could. For them, the values they receive from their masters are so much more worthwhile than the valuables they received. It is not important who gets the camel and who gets the tent. That is nothing to be remembered by. Rather it is our Jewish value to gain a measure of immortality through the memories we leave behind and the positive impact our lives had on those who will follow us.

If you knew that you were going to die tomorrow, what would you say to those surrounding you? How would you want to be remembered? What words would you want to be heard throughout the ages? Be careful; you may not have that many chances left.

Take the time, then, to share with those you love the stuff that you are really made of. Do not be afraid to open yourselves up and say who you are. Ecclesiastes is wrong when he says, "There is nothing new under the sun." He is wrong because you are something new under the sun; there has never been another you and there will never be another you.

And who you are deserves to be remembered throughout the generations. With your words and deeds, you will be. But today, remember the words of the Sages: be careful with your words for they may be the last words you ever utter.
