of God. Hanukkah offers us an opportunity to recognize the sacredness of our bodies, to offer thanks for the miracles of our bodily functions, and rededicate our physical selves to the service of God and humankind.

Hanukkah comes at a dark time in the calendar, close to the winter solstice with its shortest day and longest night. And, at a point in the month when the moon is obscured, it is literally the darkest time of the year. Our response is to light candles in an effort to draw light into the world and appreciate even the humblest, most limited light as with a blessing.

In the Jewish tradition, we are urged to be mindful of all those who are ill, and pray for and with them. Even if we ourselves and those near and dear to us are fortunate not to be suffering, we pray daily for physical cure and spiritual healing for those whom we do not know. And how appropriate it is that, as we bring light into the world with the Festival of Lights, we do all that we can, in the spirit of *Tikkun Olam*, Repairing the World, to bring a measure of light to those in need. Thus, before we light a candle on each night, as we exchange gifts with our loved ones and friends, perhaps we can also offer a prayer to God for those in need – the most powerful gift we can give. I would like to thank Rabbi Simcha Weintraub for these suggestions.

Before lighting the candles, begin each night with the following:

"Adonai, Source of healing and hope, we dedicate this night of Hanukkah to those who (complete with appropriate line below.) Give them and those who care for them rich blessings of strength and support, solace and determination. Illuminate

The fourth night of Hanukkah ... are receiving treatments

Send forth Your light and Your truth – They will lead me; They will bring me to Your holy mountain, To Your dwelling place. (Psalms 43:3)

The fifth night of Hanukkah ...are undergoing surgery With You is the source of life; In Your light do we see light. (Psalms 36:10)

The sixth night of Hanukkah ...are recovering from surgery and/or treatments

For You have saved me from death. O yes, my foot from stumbling, That I may walk in the presence of God, In the light of life. (Psalms 56:14)

The seventh night of Hanukkah ...are stepping into the next phase of life

A lamp unto my feet is Your word, A light for my path. (Psalms 119:105)

The eighth night of Hanukkah ...are surviving and incorporating the illness into their lives

Light is sown for the righteous, Radiant joy for the uprightat-heart O you righteous ones, rejoice in Adonai, And offer thanks to Adonai's holy name! (Psalms 97:11-12)

May this be a Festival of Lights for you and those you love. May God's light shine in your hearts and in the hearts of all of us, providing wholeness, completeness and shalom.

Front and Center



Hanukkah falls "late" this year – at the end of December. Each year, I answer questions during Hanukkah like, what is the difference between chanukiyot and menorahs? (We light chanukiyot, not menorahs.) How do you light the chanukiyah? (You put the candles in from right to left, facing you, and light them from left to right, so the "new" day's candle is the first one lit.) Where should the shamash, the candle

used to light the other candles, be put? Some *chanukiyot* (plural of *chanukiyah*) have the *shamash* on the far right. Some have it on the far left. Some have it raised above the other candles; some have it placed below them. This question this year is: where should it be?

Obviously, since it appears in so many places, there is no "should" about it. Apparently the *shamash* can be put just about wherever you want on the *chanukiyah*. I have a preference I'd like share with you, though. Remember the "old" style *chanukiyot*, the ones that look pretty much like a tree branch, with places for four candles on one side, four on the other side, and one, the *shamash*, in the middle? That's where I prefer the *shamash* to be: smack dab in the middle.

Don't get me wrong. I love the modern *chanukiyot*. They're beautiful, or at least many of them are. But, I like the *shamash* in the center because the center is just what's missing from many of us and much of our world. The far left and the far right are equally fanatical, and equally dangerous. People without a center are ungrounded, leaves blowing in the wind, at the mercy of their own biology and the latest fad of the moment.

Leaving the political discussion for another time, I ask you to ask yourselves: what's at your center? What's central in your life? Saying "home and family" is only partly true. Where do these values come from? There are certainly many different kinds of homes not only here in the U.S. but all over the world. The word family, we now know, means a great many more things than we used to think.

The word for our root value system is religion. That's where our understanding of the particular kinds of homes and families we value come from. The same is true for things like bravery, honesty, fidelity, kindness, compassion, even love. The "definer" of the things we value is what we call religion.

Our religion, to state the obvious, is Judaism. Even if it doesn't remind us of Temples or Rabbis or services or prayerbooks, almost all the value judgments we make come from a common source: our Judaism. It's no longer immediately visible because we Jews created these ideas so long ago they've become seamlessly integrated into the culture of the Western world, and far beyond.

Where the *shamash* is placed is really not very important. Knowing our center and where it comes from is crucially important.

Where's your *shamash*? What's at your center? Temple Shalom is one place to find out.


