1 Was Just Thinking...



One of my teachers, Dr. Jacob Rader Marcus, the founder of the American Jewish Archives, once wrote, "Thirty centuries of Hebraic, Israelite and Rabbinic Judaism cannot be easily undone. The might and tenacity of the Jewish people is evidenced not by the might of their armor, not by the swiftness of their tanks, nor their

missiles nor their guns; no, Jewish existence owes its life to one source; our learning, our studying, our books." I couldn't help but to think of Dr. Marcus recently when I learned of a new trend in higher education that started

me wondering about books and Jewish survival.

In the little town of Maryville, Missouri sits the campus of Northwest Missouri State University. The Bearcats, as they are called, are in the process of piloting a new kind of program for their students, attempting

to meet their students where they are. The program is called "The E-Reader Program" and is attempting to replace standard textbooks with an electronic version. Currently, the University has a very successful textbook rental program, where the students do not have to purchase textbooks, but can rent them on an as needed basis. Long gone (at least at this university) are the days of selling your \$75.00 textbook back to the bookstore for \$15.00!! Rather, Northwest Missouri State University is moving toward a campus devoid of traditional textbooks and similar kind of print media. According to University President Dean Hubbard,

"...interest in e-texts among higher education professionals is 'growing at an unbelievable rate.' About a dozen academic departments are participating in the pilot, which began last fall, when about 250 students used e-texts in four separate courses. This trimester, the program has been expanded to include about 500 students, plus another 3,000 who have the option of using either an e-text or traditional textbook if they are enrolled in a course using a text published by McGraw-Hill, a major producer of traditional and electronic learning materials."

Feedback from last year, Hubbard said, indicates that laptops, at least for now, provide a better platform for taking advantage of features like graphics, faculty-added material, quizzes and interactive learning exercises, though the slim, pocket-sized eReader is an excellent device "for simply reading a book from front to back."

So I started thinking, undoubtedly, other universities will begin similar programs soon, if they haven't already. Will Jewish institutions of higher learning follow suit? Will there come a day when Talmud is studied in partnership with your friend over an e-reader? Is every piece of literature to be subjected to a digital format? Will we come to a time when holding a book is

antiquated or passe? The Rabbis tell the story of [placing a drop of honey on the edges of the pages for a person just starting out to learn to symbolize the sweetness of studying and the sweetness of literally turning a page. How do we taste the honey on

an e-reader? While I am the first to be in the line for some new electronic gadget that seemingly makes the world easier and faster, this development stopped me right in my tracks. What about the relationship between person and book, the old-fashioned book? Will Jewish learning be forever altered to be a mechanical relationship between user and gadget, or will it remain a living, organic dynamic between person and history, between generations and ultimately between humans and God? I wonder...

What I do know is that nothing will replace the feel of holding a book; nothing will replace the sense of a living, breathing relationship with the past; nothing will replace the sweetness tasted when one gets to actually turn a page of Jewish learning that had been turned by our ancestors. Whatever comes of our textbooks in the future, I pray that the eternality of the Torah, the hand-written scroll, will endure and be, as it always has been, at the very center of Jewish survival.

You Decide



"Can he wear his father's tallit?" This is a question I often get when I am working with my Bar or Bat Mitzvah students and their families. "Sure," I say, "but then what will he wear?" "Oh, does he need one too?" "Depends on what you mean by 'need," I say, "and, by the way, perhaps you (the mother) may want to acquire one, too."

I'm having this conversation so often with families that I thought it was necessary that I share my thoughts with everyone at Temple Shalom. There are so many interesting questions woven into the simple question of whether my Bar Mitzvah student can wear his father's tallit at his Bar Mitzvah ceremony.

First of all, what is the purpose of wearing a tallit? A tallit is prayer wear. It's like a baseball jersey or soccer cleats, or the Longhorn shirt I put my son Ezra into on "game-day." It's the apron in the kitchen, the necktie in the office, the bowling shoes. The tallit is what Jews wear when they pray. Why? Because it has those nifty strings on its 4 corners, knotted in such a way as to remind its wearer of the 613 commandments.

Donning a tallit matters, because doing so makes a statement, a statement that say, "I wear my values, especially when I pray. I wear my commandments." Our ancestors weren't kidding when they enwrapped themselves in commandments, and we aren't kidding either. This ritual is not just beautiful and ancient – it is deeply meaningful.

Traditionally, Jewish males wore a "mini-tallit," ("tallit katan" underneath their clothes, with just the strings ("tzitzit") exposed. You have probably seen this among Chasidic Jews. Unmarried Jewish men would not wear a regular tallit at all. Then, for the wedding, the bride would give the groom a tallit as a gift. From then on he would wear the mini-tallit under his clothes all day, and the regular tallit for daytime prayers only.

In most Reform and Conservative communities, Jewish boys and girls begin to wear a tallit at their Bar/Bat Mitzvah Ceremonies. This is wonderful, especially with all of the artistic choices available out there. You can visit our gift shop, *Traditions*, to purchase one, or commission one from anywhere in the world. And it can be unique and special.

However, I have a difficult time with the notion that the tallit is for the Bar/Bat Mitzvah candidates only. It's not. A tallit is not a Bar Mitzvah costume, it is prayer wear for Jewish adults. Therefore, it makes no sense for the child to wear a tallit and the Jewish parents not to. That would be like putting UT sweatshirts on your kid while you wear an Aggie Jersey at the annual game. It's that absurd.

Furthermore, what does it mean if Dad and son wear a tallit and Mom doesn't? Or just as frequently, Dad and daughter wear a tallit and Mom doesn't. Some people are under the impression that unless you, yourself, became a Bar/Bat Mitzvah you may not wear a tallit. That is not true.

All Jews become Jewish adults at 13. The difference is whether you had a ceremony where you studied to accept the responsibilities of becoming a Jewish adult. As long as you are Jewish and over 13, it is completely appropriate to wear a tallit. (By the way, it is never too late to have a Bar/Bat Mitzvah ceremony. We have adult Bar/Bat Mitzvah classes. Come and talk to me or email me if you would like to learn more about this.)

Some of you may be thinking, "If this is so, why has the Temple not required it?" Here is where we come to the philosophy of Reform Judaism, where we believe that in matters of ritual, individuals are empowered to make their own choices. This is about choice, gender, spirituality, and family bonding.

LIFE LONG LEARNING

Creating Jewish Memories

Whether you were born Jewish or are a part of a Jewish family, what is your first Jewish memory?

For some, that may not be an easy question to answer. For others, you can probably make a list. My first Jewish memory was Shabbat dinner with my family. Growing up in the suburbs of Houston, we had Shabbat dinner every Friday night. I loved it! We would begin with the lighting of the candles, wine and challah! And my father would give the traditional blessing of the children and pull my hair every time! Then we would eat, discuss our past week, and what was going to happen throughout the next week. My brother and I would tease each other as only boys can do, but we understood that Shabbat dinner was different than the others throughout the week.

A single memory like pulling my hair during the traditional blessing of the children on Shabbat has lasted with me my entire life. Now that I am a father, I think about these memories every time I give Ezra, my son, his Shabbat blessing.

So, I ask the question again. What is your first Jewish memory? Most importantly, what is your son's or daughter's first Jewish memory? And what are *you* doing to help create those Jewish memories? In the Preschool, I know Bonnie is working with families *before* preschool-age to help with memory building. In the Religious School, Dennis Eichelbaum and Barrett Harr are working every day to create Jewish memories with our young kids and our teens. Each week, Rabbi Paley, Cantor Croll and I work to bring Jewish memories through continuing Adult Education and choir.

What can you do to help create more Jewish memories for your family? Keep in mind, my family didn't create my memory. That came from me thinking that pulling my hair was funny. However, my family created the situation to allow me to find my memory. My family made sure we had Shabbat dinner every week. We need to continue to create situations and experiences for our children and ourselves so that we can all grow memories, and look back at those memories with smiles and want to continue to create more for ourselves.

So, think about your first Jewish memory. Was it positive? Was it at home? Was it at Temple? At camp? And then think about what you are doing to help create new Jewish memories. My hope is that throughout the Jewish calendar, there are opportunities for everyone...even if it is pulling your kid's hair!
