was stunned recently when the woman in front of me ordered something that was completely unintelligible to me while the person behind the counter smiled politely and asked, "Would you like whipped cream with that?" I wondered not only what she said, but what concoction she

had ordered. It is fascinating to see the emergence of a new language fostered by commercial enterprise. Who knew how many ways you could order coffee? Remember when it came black, in a cup?

With the concept coffee designer firmly entrenched in our culture, what does the emergence of a variety of flavors and possibilities mean for the Jewish community? How does this concept impact Jewish communal survival?

Recently, I read a report entitled, "Grande Soy Vanilla Latte with Cinnamon, No Foam: Jewish Community and Identity in an Age of Unlimited Choices," by a New York Jewish non-profit organization. The findings in this study were revealing. The current generation of 18-25 year olds is known as "Generation Y" and is marked by the culture of unlimited choices in every aspect of their lives. The Jewish community is not immune from this. As a matter of fact, as the report suggests, for American Jews in Generation Y, being Jewish is not their sole identity. This generation has unlimited access to American society, therefore, Generation Y Jews behave much like all other Generation Y Americans, regardless of religion. Today's young Jews have multiple identities shaped by many factors, including intermarriage in their families, diverse social networks, and dynamic boundaries around geography and other identity characteristics such as gender and sexual orientation. Being Jewish is part of a larger identity mosaic for today's Jews.

We know from previous research that earlier generations of Jews felt a need to maintain tight connections as they experienced anti-Semitism, workplace

I don't know how many of you discrimination and other challenges. But, unlike Jews in are Starbucks patrons, but I, for the pre- and post-World War II era, this generation is fully one, am partial to the "Grande integrated and does not need close communal cohesion in order to survive in a hostile society. Many Generation Y Jews no longer personally experience anti-Semitism or exclusion from the opportunities society has to offer; therefore, they are similar to their non-Jewish peers in that they worry about getting good grades, finding jobs and socializing with friends more than they worry about their religious identities.

> Despite their integrated appearance, Generation Y Jews feel incredibly self-confident about their Jewish identities. In contrast to the survival ethic of many of their grandparents' Jewish journeys, and contrary to the continuity fears of the 1990s, Generation Y Jews are very

> > positive about being Jewish. This is particularly important because members Generation Y are in stages of adolescent development where self-confidence and building self-esteem are critical to their adult identity formations. There are limits to their selfconfidence, however; young Jews in this study do not claim to have a depth of knowledge about Jewish rituals, liturgy and text. Being Jewish remains a complicated tangle of spiritual, cultural, historical and ethnic dimensions, but their Jewish

50 for 50 Revisited



At Yom Kippur, I explained our new plan called "50 for 50." Our plan is to not only eradicate the \$1.8 million loan we took out for the renovation of our building (money very well spent), but increase our endowment to place Temple Shalom in its best financial position in its history.

As I said at Yom Kippur, another ten year loan for \$1.8 million would add over \$180,000 to our budget each year (10 x 180,000 = 1.8 million). If we can find 50 individuals or groups to give \$50,000, that will give us 2.5 million. ($50 \times 50,000 = 2,500,000$. We will pay off the debt of 1.8 million, and increase our Endowment Fund by about \$700,000.

Once we have our Endowment Fund at \$1.7 million (and no loan), each year we can take the return on investment to supplement our budget. This could actually make the Endowment Fund our largest annual

fundraiser, and it would not have to come from our congregants' pockets each year. We all know how critical it is to maintain a nice balance in our Endowment Fund; it is our savings account should we have the need for a new roof or another emergency. (As I am typing I am also spitting three times.)

I recognize that some congregants may have heard \$50,000 and stopped listening after that, so I want to be clear that each and every level of contribution helps us achieve our goal. The number 50 ties well with the 50th anniversary, but someone who is able to pledge and contribute \$500, \$5,000, or \$500,000 over the next five years is a blessing. Remember, these are pledges that can be for as long as five years.

We all make choices for where we spend our money. We do not want anyone not to pay their heating bill in order to give to the Temple. We just hope that, when you are making your decisions of where to invest your income, your house of worship be considered among the priorities. Our Temple is our second home; it is a refuge when we have sorrow, it is a harbor to celebrate a simcha, and it is a haven for Jewish communal gathering. Temple Shalom is there for us when we need it, and we all need to continue to maintain its strength and stability.

You and Your Genes

There are only two ways to know if you are a carrier for a Jewish genetic disease:

get screened or give birth to an affected child.

Affordable screening in Dallas

Did you know that there is a group of severe and often fatal Jewish genetic diseases with a higher carrier rate among Jews?

I in 4 Ashkenazi Jews is a carrier for at least I in 19 of the diseases which we are currently screening for. I in 3 Sephardic/Persian Jews is a carrier for at least I in 8 of these diseases. A carrier means that you, yourself, are healthy but could one day pass a disease on to your future children, if you and your partner are both carriers for that same disease. The good news is that you can still have healthy babies of your own. But first you need to know your carrier status.

This carrier screening is for you if you are: single married partnered between 18 and 50 in an interfaith relationship gay or straight already have children but are planning to expand your family considering the use of donor egg/sperm - Ashkenazi - Persian - Sephardic - have even one Jewish grandparent

Getting screened is a simple blood test. Pre-registration is recommended.

Get Screened in Dallas on November 2. Find out if you're a carrier.

My wife, Patti, and I had been married just over a year, when our first child, Allan was born. Our joy was overwhelming and our love for him limitless. We cherished every moment with him but becam concerned when he began slowing down and losing milestones when he was approaching his first birthday. It was a



week after he turned one when we were informed that he had Tay-Sachs disease, an incurable, progressive Jewish Genetic Disease that gradually robbed him of all of his humanity; his vision, his wakefulness, his movement. Within two-and-a half years of his diagnosis, before his fourth birthday, he died



How could we have let this happen to our poor baby? Patti and I, who are both Jewish physicians, thought that our children were beyond risk.We had never been tested for the Tay-Sachs gene. We learned, at Allan's

expense, that every child is at risk, particularly with a Jewish parent.

With the knowledge that we were carriers of the Tay-Sachs gene, we worked with our doctors to have two healthy children after Allan, one of whom is a carrier, and both of whom are grown and in college now.

I in 4 Ashkenazi Jews is a carrier for at least I in 19 of the diseases that we are currently screening for. I in 3 Persian/ Sephardic lews is a carrier for at least I in 8 of these diseases. The screening is in Dallas at Temple Shalom on November 2. If you have even one Jewish grandparent, you could

be a carrier. If you are single, dating, partnered, married, gay, straight, in an interfaith relationship, or considering getting pregnant through donor egg/sperm, please get screened. This carrier screening will provide you with information to plan your family and prevent your child's suffering with any of these devastating illnesses

Meet Shirley & Bob Zlotky


Please introduce your family.

The early years were so intense. So many people were involved daily and weekly. We made many life-long friends along the way; and, of course, how far we all have come!


If you were the Rabbi or President of the Congregation, what is the one thing you would like to see at Temple Shalom that we currently don't have, do or participate in?

Where Do Rabbis Come From?



My First Year as a Rabbi

During my last year of rabbinical school, I would often find myself daydreaming about my future. What would my life be like as a real, ordained rabbi? What would my days look like? Would my congregants like me? Would I get along with my senior rabbi? These questions excited me and terrified me simultaneously. For five years (well, six for me with an added masters of education year) we sit in class, study hard and prepare ourselves to be the best rabbis we can possibly be. While we all take slightly different paths following ordination, we learn the same skills, gather information and hope that we will be happy and successful in our future endeavors. As 5th year rabbinical students approaching ordination, we prepare ourselves for our first year in the field. We are told about the challenges of settling in and feeling comfortable in a new community and congregation. We are warned about pacing ourselves and are encouraged to ask lots of questions, and above all, we are advised to create strong relationships with our fellow staff and senior clergy.

In reflecting on my first year as a rabbi, I can easily say that it has not only been an incredible first year in the field, but quite possibly the best year of my life. Never in my wildest dreams could I have imagined the type of welcome I received upon arriving in Dallas and at Temple Shalom. I was greeted with warmth, excitement and genuine Southern hospitality. I received hugs on my very first Shabbat and kind words of welcome every day for the first three months. A transition committee aided me in finding a place to live, introduced me to new friends and community members, and even recommended a nail salon! I quickly felt comfortable in my new community and transitioned smoothly into my new position.

As I settled in and started to prepare for High Holidays and the start of the school year, I found myself feeling both excited and anxious. I hoped that the knowledge I had gained at HUC and the skills I had acquired would help me to be successful. I wanted to impress my new community and make them feel proud of their decision to hire me.

Since those first days on the job until today, I can easily say that I have utilized just about everything that I learned and experienced at HUC during my time there. Whether it is referencing old notes from a class on Job, recalling my experience in CPE or utilizing a curriculum I prepared for a student pulpit visit, I find myself feeling unbelievably grateful for everything I received from teachers, mentors and fellow classmates.

HUC prepared me for success. The faculty instilled in me a wide array of knowledge and gave me the tools to share it with others. My experience in student pulpits and local Cincinnati congregations prepared me for practical rabbinics, for addressing difficult situations and for providing rabbinic support for congregants and students. I learned during class time, I practiced my skills during CPE and student pulpit visits, and I reflected with mentors and advisors. I cannot thank HUC enough for helping me to succeed and for giving me the confidence to challenge myself and grow.

As my first year comes to the close, I can't help but feel incredibly lucky. I have had the fortune of working with a senior rabbi who encourages me on a daily basis, mentors me and guides me with a gentle hand. Rabbi Andrew Paley has quickly become one of my greatest role models, confidants and friends. He treats me like a partner and challenges me to be the best rabbi I can be.

I have found my home at Temple Shalom and I could not have gotten here without HUC. I am forever grateful for my experiences and for everything my teachers and mentors did to help me to arrive at this moment of blessing. I am happy, healthy and prepared for many more years in the rabbinate.

Thanks to Jeff Kort, one of our most dedicated and talented teachers, I was made aware of a very special organization called *Rachel's Challenge*. *Rachel's Challenge* was created based on the life and writing of Rachel Scott, the first victim of the 1999 Columbine tragedy. The organization aims to motivate and equip students to start and sustain a

chain reaction of kindness and compassion to transform schools and communities. Before her tragic death, Rachel wrote these words: "I have this theory that if one person can go out of their way to show compassion, then it will start a chain reaction of the same. People will never know how far a little kindness can go."

As Jews we have an almost identical theory: *Mitzvah* goreret mitzvah; averah goreret averah: One good deed leads to another; one transgression leads to another. Just as Haley Joel Osment taught us in the movie *Pay It Forward* (2000), a good deed paid forward leads to more good deeds. Changing the world begins with doing favors and acts of loving kindness for others.

In reflecting on Rachel's challenge and brainstorming with Jeff Kort, we came up with a way of teaching and demonstrating this concept to our students. We wanted the students in our school to see the power of their good deeds and the incredible impact they can have on our school and community.

On the first day of school, students were asked to write down on a small strip of construction paper one good deed they did over the summer. Following this, students were asked to share their good deed (if they felt comfortable) and then all the strips were combined together in a paper chain. Each week during Sunday school, students have been asked to begin their day with this activity reflecting on their mitzvot from the previous week. *Ozrim* (teen assistants) assemble the mitzvot after sharing time and add to the growing chain hung on the walls of the classroom. On the last day of school, each classroom will present their mitzvot chains and will connect them to one another. Our goal is to have a chain long enough to wrap around our entire school!

Through this activity, students are reminded of their power to change the world for good. They are motivated to do acts of loving kindness and are reminded of the saying, *mitzvah goreret mitzvah*. Our school not only teaches Hebrew and Judaica, but kindness, love and respect for all people. We not only build minds, but we engage and grow hearts. And as Whitney Houston reminds us in song, "Children are our future. Teach them well and let them lead the way!"

Sanitation Services - Frequently Asked Questions

What is "Too Good To Throw Away"?

"Too Good To Throw Away" is the well-named recycling program for Dallas residents. Over 50% of what we toss into the garbage is, literally, too good to throw away. Each of the recyclable materials (listed in the next question) can either be sold to a processor or be used directly by the city, in place of a more costly alternative.

Plastics, for example, sell for approximately \$165 per ton. On the other hand, used glass has very little market value, but the City can crush and use it instead of buying expensive gravel.

What types of materials will be collected for recycling?

Just about everything! Think of these five terms: PLASTIC, GLASS, METAL, PAPER, CARDBOARD.

All of the following items may be placed (without sorting) in the blue recycling bins in the classrooms and offices and in the larger green recycling bins in the kitchen, as well as the large recycling dumpster outside the kitchen entrance.

Plastic

Only containers with the recycling symbol for numbers 1-7

NO plastic bags, NO Styrofoam products, NO chemical containers, NO toys

Glass

Bottles and jars of any color

Please note*

For the safety of our collection staff, please contain any broken glass in a paper bag before placing in blue recycling bin.

NO window glass, NO light bulbs, NO ceramics, NO mirrors, NO Pyrex, NO fiberglass

Metal

Aluminum, tin, and steel containers

NO aluminum foil, No pie plates, NO parts, NO toys, NO electronics, NO appliances

Paper

Office paper (paper clips and staples are okay), window envelopes, magazines, catalogues, paperback books, phone books and brown paper bags

NO rubber bands, NO plastic wrappings, NO hard back books

Cardboard

Food and detergent boxes, paper egg cartons, 12-pack drink cartons, folded corrugated boxes, cereal boxes

NO waxed cardboard, NO plastic or foil lining from cereal or cracker boxes, NO pizza boxes or food contaminated boxes



THE LONE STAR IN THE VILLAGE: THOUGHTS ON BEING JEWISH IN TEXAS

Moving from London to Texas at such an interesting time in Jewish history has in some ways allowed me to escape out of my old reality and into a new one. My thought processes about Judaism remain the same but allow me to show my new community just how lucky I think they are.

This new reality includes being one of many.

And I mean MANY.

Many colours, creeds, types and religions.

The US itself is such a huge country that whilst in the Jewish world there are just a few degrees of separation between people, here you are still a very small minority but are allowed religious freedom.

Live your life the way you want, just abide by the laws of the country and respect everyone around you.

I came from Borehamwood, a modern 'ghetto' town, where the whole world knew you, your name and probably your national insurance number.

Here no-one knew me until I went out and got people to know me.

Even then, they will never understand how I grew up differently to them in a post-Holocaust Europe, where most of my friends had living Holocaust survivors in their families or had met them before they died.

Judaism in Texas is very free. People are open, friendly, warm and welcoming.

Judaism here is based around being part of a group or network of some sort.

Whether it's the Jewish Federation or your local temple.

Smiles abound and you often hear stories from the older generation of their ancestors: how some got straight off the boat in Ellis Island or entered Galveston whilst others simply stayed in London or elsewhere in Europe.

I think they have no idea of what real anti-Semitism means.

They won't know about the hatred and I'm wondering if it's because everyone here has so much space around them. Perhaps London is too crowded and the lack of personal space breeds intolerance.

The thoughts of my fellow Jews in Texas – when the three boys were kidnapped and killed and the rockets began being fired – were very subdued.

Israel is a LONG WAY from here. That said, the strength of feeling is very visible.

Everyone wants to visit Israel. They are considered lucky if they have.

More than ever, teenagers here are going, strengthening the links in comparison to previous generations.

People now have relatives there.

I've made friends with an Israeli family who went back to visit recently and returned to tell stories of taking their four-year-old daughter into a bomb shelter and showing her the reality of life there. She found it hard to believe.

Her Texan reality is a swimming pool and a big house in Plano, where planes do not fly overhead and peace exists.

I am proud to say I am Jewish, although I have thought twice about wearing my Magen David around my neck.

I've had many discussions with my colleague at work who is a French Jew, also living in Dallas, Texas.

He told me that anti-Semitism in France is down to two things: the media and ignorant people, who have been hit by the economic downturn and are angry at the world.

I can breathe here in Dallas, Texas.

My fellow Jews are very lucky to live here in many, many ways.

They understand both sides of the equation and are quick to judge Obama on his actions (or lack of).

But they care.

They really care.

I will continue to tell them what being Jewish in London is really like.

And whilst I didn't live through the recent months of political and religious turmoil, anger, hatred and despair, I can tell you that my heart remains in Borehamwood, Hertfordshire with its short 4.5 hour flight to Israel.

I will continue to pray that the Jewish community can thrive alongside other religious communities at peace.

And if I hear about any more local shops banning Jewish school kids on the grounds of being Jewish, I will make sure that everyone here knows about it so that they realise just how lucky they are.
