

I Was Just Thinking...

Pretty soon, you will be ankle deep in matzah meal. It's Pesach time again and that strange time of year when we clean out our cupboards, our shelves and our spirits of all the chametz that has accumulated since last Pesach. We engage in a weeklong denial that Pesach foods taste good, that our cholesterol doesn't go up just because we're

food

eating a dozen eggs a day, and that kosher for Passover pasta is not an oxymoron. That being said, while Pesach may ask us to do some things we may not care for with regard to our eating, it also asks us to do something regarding other people and their ability to eat.

In the beginning of the Seder, the Haggadah tells us, "This is the bread of affliction which our ancestors ate in the land of

Egypt. Let all who are hungry come in and eat. Everyone is obligated to celebrate Passover. This year we are here; next year we shall be in the Land of Israel. This year we are slaves. Next year we shall be a free people in the Land of Israel."

Let all who are hungry come in and eat. It is an interesting command that begins our collective, communal story. Why does the story of our people begin with a command to invite

all who are hungry to come in and eat? I don't know about you, but I have never had a hungry stranger into my home for Seder, even though the door may be open. So what do we do with such a command? How should it be understood in light of our own situations nowadays?

I believe the placement of the command early on in the Haggadah is there to teach us something about the overall possibility of redemption. Remember that the Haggadah is the quintessential story of Divine redemption. And it's not just any story; it's our story, so it matters to us more. We are also commanded to feel as if we were personally freed from Egypt, so how much more so is this a story of our individual as well as our collective destiny? So the story begins with a simple command, "Let all who are hungry come in and eat." Think about it. Satisfying our basic need for food and eliminating the possibility of encountering those who are hungry is both a primal basic need for an individual, and a basic primal duty of every As Isaiah said, "If you offer your single community. compassion to the hungry and satisfy the famished creature then shall your light shine in darkness and your gloom shall be like noonday." (Isaiah 58:3) We know the studies that show that people who are well fed and have a nutritious diet are both mentally and physically healthier, stronger and more able to deal with the stresses and strains of daily life. What we also know is that it is possible to eradicate hunger and food shortages throughout this country and even the world with a little effort.

What can we do? On a national level, the best way to systematically eliminate hunger is to contribute to MAZON: A Jewish Response to Hunger. Founded in 1985, Mazon is a national, nonprofit agency which allocates donations from the Jewish community to nonprofit organizations providing food, help and hope to hungry people of all faiths and backgrounds. Mazon's hunger-relief efforts are funded by Jews and others who donate three percent of the cost of weddings, Bar and Bat Mitzvahs, other joyous and life-cycle events; who contribute to Mazon at the High Holy Days and Passover; and who make contributions in honor or in memory of friends and loved ones. Mazon ("food" in Hebrew) was founded to build a bridge between Jews who enjoy the blessings of abundance. and the millions of children and adults who are hungry, or who live at the very edge of hunger, each day. Even in this era of unprecedented abundance, more than 33 million Americans, including 12 million children, are hungry or at the very edge of

hunger, because their families lack the money to buy sufficient food. There is simply no need for this tragedy to continue on further. You can help. You can make a difference. If you are ready to let all who are hungry have a chance to eat then, you will not only save a life, you will have contributed to saving the world. You can find Mazon at www.mazon.org.

At the local and state level, hunger statistics are staggering. Did you

know that Texas has six Congressional districts in the top 30 across the country in Food Hardship in 2012-2013? That Texas ranks ninth in the country for food insecurity, with more than 1.7 million children in our state at risk for hunger? That nearly 1 in 5 Texans (4.41 million) are living in poverty? That more than 6 billion dollars of private and state funds designated for hunger related programs in Texas went unused in 2013? That only 50% of Texans eligible for SNAP (formerly food stamps) participate in the program?

What can we do? Of course donate time, dollars and food products to the North Texas Food Bank and/or the Food Pantry of the Jewish Family Service right here in town. www.ntfb.org and www.jfs.org. Your effort, your acts of compassion, your donations of time, dollars and love really matter, now more than ever. How does the Haggadah end? We think it ends with, "Next year in Jerusalem." Check your Haggadah. Most Haggadahs end with the song, "Who Knows One?" And, therein lies the eternal question. If we follow God's command to help those who are in need, to Let all who are hungry come in and eat, will we, indeed, come to know the One, the Redeemer of all? I pray this is so, for next year, in Jerusalem, may it be God's will that every single person on earth knows peace, happiness, and prosperity. Debbie, Molly, Sammy and I wish you and yours a Chag Sameach, and a sweet Passover holiday.

Constitution Evolution

Based upon the recommendation of the Constitution Committee, on March 3, 2014, the Temple Shalom Board of Trustees approved sending to the congregation for consideration at the next Congregational Meeting (May 4) the following proposed amendments to the Constitution:

ARTICLE 2

PURPOSE

MISSION STATEMENT: To inspire in our congregation an enduring relationship with God, Torah and the Jewish people through communal worship, study, gathering and community service.

Section 1. The purpose of Temple Shalom is to enable all of its members to develop a relationship with God, Torah and the Jewish people through communal worship, study and assembly. Temple Shalom will function in an inclusive and egalitarian atmosphere. To ensure the continuity of the Jewish people, Temple Shalom shall promote the education of the fundamental and enduring principles of Judaism as understood and practiced by the Reform Movement, and apply those principles to the values and conduct of the individual, the family and the society in which we live and participate. In order to advance the cause of Reform Judaism in America, in Israel and throughout the world, Temple Shalom shall affiliate itself with the Union for Reform Judaism, herein referred to as URJ.

ARTICLE 16

AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws shall be presented in writing and shall be proposed by the Board of Trustees or by at least twenty member units of the Congregation, and shall be filed with the Secretary. Such amendments may be acted on at any regular meeting of the Congregation or at any special meeting called for that purpose. Copies of the proposed amendments shall be mailed to each member, along with the notice of the meeting at least twenty-one days prior thereto. No motion that will modify a proposed amendment, or substitute another amendment, will be acted on unless the proposal or substitution is submitted to the Temple Office at least 14 days before the Congregational Meeting and the Temple Office sends out a notification of such proposal or substitution for receipt by the Congregation at least 3 days before the meeting complies with the notice requirements of this Article. An affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members of the Congregation present at a duly called Congregation meeting shall be necessary to adopt any amendment.

These proposed amendments will remove unnecessary redundancy and address a concern raised by the congregation at the Congregational Meeting held on the Constitution last October.

A few weeks ago I attended *TribeFest*, an annual convening of young Jewish leaders by *JFNA* (*Jewish Federation of North America*). It was an incredible few days in New Orleans! I heard some fascinating speakers (including Josh Malina from my favorite TV show, *Scandal*), attended enriching and thought provoking breakout sessions and reconnected with old friends from all over the country.

Keynote speaker, Doug Ulman, President and CEO of the *LiveStrong Foundation* gave an inspiring speech about his experience as a three-time cancer survivor and the impact of community on his recovery. As he was wrapping up, Ulman described the difference between a crowd and a community. In a crowd, everyone is pushing and trying to get ahead of others. People solely think about themselves and how they can successfully navigate through it. In a community, people come together to act around a common purpose or "intent". Members interact and create relationships and depend on one another.

As the religious school year is coming to an end, I can't help but reflect on the past seven months. Besides all the wonderful memories and interactions I have had, I am most honored and proud to be part of a community, and not a crowd. Our school is based on the values of *kavod* (respect), *kehila kedosha* (holy community) and *derech eretz* (mentschlekeit). These values inform the way teachers and students interact with one another and experience Jewish education at Temple Shalom. They aid us in building relationships with one another and remind us that we can depend on those in our community.

Temple Shalom faculty and Ozrim work hard to create safe, welcoming and, most of all, fun and engaging classroom communities. At the same time, our Kesher Parent Coordinators plan and facilitate offsite grade level gatherings for informal socializing. These combined efforts are transforming our school into a true community. While this takes time, energy and intention, I know that we are moving in the right direction. As I walk through the hallways on Sunday morning, the sounds of laughter fill my ears and I can't help but smile and remember the reason I became a Jewish educator. Students are engaging with one another, making new friends and experiencing Judaism within the warmth of a Jewish community.


