I Was Just Thinking...



I've been thinking about anniversaries lately. My parents will celebrate their 60th wedding anniversary this month. Debbie and I will celebrate our 25th wedding anniversary in August. Temple Shalom celebrated its 50th anniversary 2 years ago. The Temple Shalom Sisterhood celebrated its 50th anniversary this past year. This August will mark my 13th anniversary at Temple Shalom. Marking important moments in our lives with "anniversaries" gives us pause to reflect on the original event – where we were, what we looked like, who was around us – as well as how that event changed us and what that event means these many years later.

There are two anniversaries – one in June and one in July – that I have been thinking about especially, and trying to make sense of them as I try to understand not only how to commemorate them, but what those moments mean, for me, for our communities, and for their place in history.

The first, in July, July 7th to be exact, is the anniversary of the 5 Dallas Police officers who were killed during a Black Lives Matter march near El Centro College in downtown Dallas. Watching the terrible scene unfold on TV was awful and scary. How could that be happening in our town, to police officers? Who could do such a terrible thing to those who put their lives at risk to protect us? In our city, which, in its infamy of high profile shootings, is still reeling in many ways from that stain of violence. We asked ourselves: What does this mean? How could this be? Are we better than this? Can we do anything about it? Can we learn not to be so divided?

In the days that followed, our city saw an incredible outpouring of love and support for our police department, even as we acknowledged that problems exist in our community. Blue and yellow ribbons were everywhere. We tried to say that while hatred and violence, division and anger persist, those are not the only voices in our town – just the opposite – there are waves of care and concern to ride toward the ultimate goal of real peace and real justice. As I sat on the stage of the Meyerson Symphony stage with President Obama and the other dignitaries that day, trying to offer some measure of support, I knew at that moment that not only would the 5 officers killed always be remembered, but that their lives would stand as a constant reminder of the effort needed to bring about the wholeness we need and seek and the extra effort each of us needs to make, every day, to see that to reality. We can and should do no less.

Almost a year later, what has changed? Transpired? To the untrained eye, not a lot looks different. We have gone back to our lives, our city is still here. Chief Brown retired. We have a new city council and new city manager. The Mayor is still here. But, we are still in mourning and Jews know mourning the death of loved ones takes a year. Not much difference can happen when we are still in mourning. Yet, conversations are happening. Neighbors are trying to reach out to those who are strangers. People we don't know are becoming slightly more familiar. It is slow and tedious work, but relationship building is happening. Imagine what next year will bring...

The other anniversary is in June, June 10 to be exact. June 10 will mark the 50th anniversary of the conclusion of the 6 day war in Israel. During those amazing days of June 5 -10, 1967, Israel expanded her territory, defeated 3 neighboring armies, unified Jerusalem and secured her

place in her neighborhood, once and for all. I wasn't alive to celebrate the miracle, but I have inherited the love of Israel and never-ending desire to see her safe and secure. What an amazing moment indeed in the history of Israel and the Jewish people.

To be sure, this anniversary should give us pause to consider what is significant and what exactly we are celebrating. Without a doubt we should rightly rejoice at the bravery and courage of Israel's defenders,

who, in a stinging and stunning military conquest, smashed not only the militaries of her enemies but destroyed the notion of Arab exceptionalism promoted most aggressively by Egypt and Gamal Abdel Nasser. We should rightly rejoice at being able to worship and celebrate at the Western Wall, long denied to us, but now eternally reunited. We should rightly rejoice at the way Israel, only 19 years old at the time, emerged from those shaky uncertain days into a respected member of the family of nations.

But, with the celebration came the uncertainty of how to be this new maturing country while administering new territories with a people hostile towards Israel's very existence. In the aftermath of the war and its victories, Israel had to learn how to govern anew with a serious problem. It has been said that this 7th day, the day after the war, is one in which Israel has been living for the past 50 years. Knowing that the West Bank and Gaza, Palestinian refugees, settlements and final peace negotiations are all problems that must be solved, Israel and the Palestinians have been at a 50 year stalemate that threatens to unravel

Anniversaries are, indeed, important mileposts along our life's journey. We should note them with appropriate reactions. But, if we don't learn from them, if we don't grow from them, if we don't emerge different because of them, then their significance is diminished and their influence missed. Noting how important the original events were, we should do no less than try our hardest to become the people, the city and the country we are most destined to become. I pray this will happen for you, for me and for us all. Happy anniversary!

with each passing year. As we celebrate her victories this June we also struggle with reality in which Israel finds herself. The questions raised 50 years ago still ring true today; what do we do with the Palestinians?... with the Territories? Who are we to become if we choose one path over the other? Will we remain Jewish and Democratic? As is the case with everything Israel, it is neither a joyous pure celebration nor a completely dark and desperate valley. Or better, we are always optimists, with worried looks on our faces.

Onward and Upward

June 1st marks the first day of my second year as President of the Board of Trustees. As I reflect upon the first twelve months, there is no question we had an amazing year filled with good works, spiritual growth, and plenty of laughter. I know if I asked each of you to give me your top three moments I would get very few lists that look alike. The three top moments that come to mind for me are the congregational trip to Israel, the Brotherhood Shalom Award honoring the Reverend Dr. Neil Cazares-Thomas, and the Shabbat service with the Dallas Street Choir. In fact, do feel free to send me your three – I would love to know what really touched your hearts this past year.

The year was not without challenge, however. We mourned together the loss of some of our most beloved congregants. National events such as the shooting at the Pulse nightclub in Orlando or the shooting of police officers here in our own city simultaneously broke our hearts and enraged us. But, we had our clergy and each other for comfort and strength. We also had the challenge of our own demographics. Our membership has been declining and this has created some financial pressure. Relieving the pressure was the focus of my first year and culminated in the affirmative vote we received at the Congregational Meeting in May to proceed with a potential land sale to greatly enhance our endowment fund. There is work still to be done in this area, but I am confident we have taken a great stride forward in bettering our financial future.

Now that reflection is over, it is time to look forward. The endowment growth is greatly beneficial, but it isn't sufficient to get us to the position we desire. The focus for this fiscal year is two-fold. First, we need to bring new members to Temple Shalom. Second, we need more of our current congregants to get engaged and involved. If we make strides in these two areas I promise you, along with the increased endowment, we will be in a position of strength. I haven't said anything that every other President before me hasn't preached - of course we need to add congregants. The hard part is going to be developing and executing a strategy to do so.

In the 2013 Pew study, it was found that membership in Reform Judaism is contracting; whereas, the ranks of the unaffiliated and Orthodox Judaism is growing. I have no reason to believe over the last three and half years this position has changed. The URJ has spent considerable time considering the matter and, though they haven't discovered a silver bullet, the message I have heard is that we need to meet people where they are. We cannot simply expect that what we love is going to be enough to convince others to be part of the family. Our challenge is going to require us to think creatively. It is going to require us to look at the "competition". What are other congregations, Jewish and other, doing that works? Observing our Orthodox brothers and sisters, it is apparent that personal engagement is key. Size can be a strength, but it can also become an impediment. We need to be less institutional and create more person-to-person connections. We do some great things in this space and there are others already planned for implementation, but my challenge to all of us is to keep our thinking big and bold. We need to be doing more in the community, in our homes, in smaller groups, and in non-traditional ways. Finally, as we work hard to bring in others, we need to make sure we don't neglect those already in the tent.

The job of strengthening the congregation does not belong to the President or Board or the clergy or the professional staff alone. It is going to take each one of us sharing ideas, selling Temple to the broader community, and creating special experiences and moments for each other. Together, I know we will have a great year ahead.

A Note from Cantor Devorah Avery



The Big Question – Why continue involvement in the Jewish community after becoming B'nei Mitzvah?

Recently, I was asked through email why I felt it was important that students continue coming to religious school after becoming B'nei Mitzvah. Instead of responding with the first obvious thoughts that went through my mind, I wanted to really think about my answer. Why is it important? Does participation in religious school really make that much of a difference in a person's life? Why continue to be involved through High School? What do kids really gain from being involved in the Jewish community?

Before I answer these questions, I will share my own story. Growing up in Oklahoma, the only real way to feel our Jewish identity was by belonging to and being active in the Jewish community. My family didn't live in an area where the next Reform congregation was a mere ten minutes away. My temple is one of three in Tulsa, OK; the other two synagogues are Conservative and Ultra-Orthodox. In the entire state, there are four Reform congregations affiliated with the Union of Reform Judaism. Four.

At Temple Israel of Tulsa, I was in a class of 14 students. Eleven of us continued on through Confirmation. That summer, following Confirmation, our entire class participated in the NFTY in Israel program. Most of us continued on in the High School program through graduation.

I'm sure my situation was unique, but in addition to being involved in the High School program at the temple, working as a Teacher's Assistant for Sunday School, singing in the choir, and participating in BBYO and NFTY, while my High School friends were out going to parties and occasionally getting into trouble on Friday nights, I was at services with my family. I'll admit there were many times I wished I was out with my friends. Looking back as an adult, however, I feel proud of my commitments.

The question above caused me to ponder again what I've pondered many times before. Who would I be if I hadn't literally grown up in the Jewish community; if the smell of the Temple in Tulsa wasn't almost as comforting to me as the smell of my parents' house? Obviously, I have no clue who I would be. What I can say is the following: Being a part of the Jewish community has taught me things that I may not have learned elsewhere.

My answer to the parent who posed the question to me was as follows:

There is a lot these kids can get from being involved in the temple that they may not get elsewhere - a deeper connection to their Jewish identity, a better understanding of what it means to be Jewish, a close relationship to the Jewish community, Jewish friends, and teachings of ethics and morals from a spiritual perspective.

All of the above are important but, for me, it is the last reason that is the most important. A particularly moving experience from a few years ago helped clarify this for me. I walked in on a High School class being taught by a colleague. They were working on an activity about families who make minimum wage and live on food stamps. The students had to plan out a budget to live on for the month. They had to balance the needs for the whole family and the mere pennies they had to work with. Needless to say, they did not have an easy time figuring this out.

I found this lesson deeply moving. In an instant, I understood what I learned from being a part of the Jewish community my whole life. Judaism isn't just about worship and holidays and prayers. Reform Judaism focuses on *Tikkun Olam*, repairing the world. It focuses on loving our neighbors as ourselves. Judaism teaches us compassion towards others and to look inward at ourselves and continue the endless quest to be better people. Other than at home, where else are our kids going to go to focus primarily on these kinds of things?

For me, it's obvious why students should stay on past becoming b'nei mitzvah and participate in *Next Dor*. But there are other ways they can participate, too. They can get involved in the Teen Choir, they can join the new BBYO chapter at Temple Shalom, they can participate in NFTY events, they can come to services, they can work as Ozrim in the religious school on Sundays. The list goes on and on. Help your kids find something that's meaningful to them to take part in.

When becoming b'nei mitzvah, children learn about Judaism, Jewish ritual, and the Jewish community. After becoming b'nei mitzvah, students focus on their personal Jewish identity and how they can shape it. For any of you who aren't sure whether or not you or your kids should continue to be a part of Temple Shalom, contact me or the rabbis or someone else here and have a conversation with us first. We want what is best for you and your families and we want to help you figure out what that is.

A Summer of ReJEWvenation 2.0



Everything slows down when summer finally rolls in. The halls of religious school are quiet, the days are longer (and hotter) and we finally have a moment to reflect and relax. It is a time of renewal, a time of peace, a time to rejuvenate before the school year begins again. Now, just because we take a break from religious school during the summer months, doesn't mean we need to take a break from Judaism. Last summer, I offered a list of 5 things you can do with your family to do what I call "reJEWvenate", an opportunity to rejuvenate your Judaism and refresh your Jewish identity without the added stresses and time constraints of the school year. This year, I will add some new ideas and suggestions for you and your family to try!

- 1) Tap into your creative side and create Jewish ritual items with Pinterest inspiration! Simply type in the name of a ritual item into the Pinterest search engine and find a project that is appealing to you and your children. Some of my favorites include the Lego mezuzah, mason jar Shabbat candle sticks and an Altoids Box Chanukah menorah!
- 2) Practice decoding Hebrew letters and vowels as you and your kiddos crack a summer message in English written with Hebrew letters! Email my assistant, Karen Thompson at kthompson@templeshalomdallas.org.
- 3) Explore Jewish home rituals with your family and choose one to try during the summer months. This could be lighting Shabbat candles on Friday night, kissing the mezuzah when entering the home, taking a Shabbat walk on Saturday afternoons, or saying the shema before bedtime. Trying out a new ritual is a great way to reJEWvenate and possibly find a renewed connection to God and Judaism.
- 4) Practice your Hebrew by labeling parts of your house with their corresponding Hebrew words (ie. kitchen table = shulchan, bed = meeta, door = delet, etc.). Just seeing the Hebrew letters and vocabulary around the house will automatically increase comprehension and familiarity. Email my assistant, Karen Thompson at kthompson@templeshalomdallas.org for a document with these pre-made Hebrew labels ready to be cut out and taped around the house!



The class will be taught by Rabbi Paley and Rabbi Boxman with guest speakers from the community.






