

were invented in 1894 by accident, by John Harvey Kellogg and his brother Will? The first commercially available box of Kellogg's Corn Flakes was sold in 1906 and in 1909, Kellogg's added

a prize in their cereal; The Funny Jungleland Moving Pictures Booklet available with the purchase of two packages. The offer was available for twenty-three years! There have been many wonderful marketing campaigns for Corn Flakes, but my favorite one I saw many years ago. It was a picture of the box with the tag line,

"Kellogg's Corn Flakes: Try them again for the first time!" It was and is a fantastic reminder to try again the things that we love, as if it were the first time, and for some to try things for the first time, hoping you'll love it every time.

Try it again for the first time. A very Jewish sounding dictum indeed. Attempt to see the sameness of the world through the same eyes, yet yielding a different vision. When others

see desperation and despair, the prophets saw hope and possibility. Where some see isolation and disconnection, Jewish tradition sees a minyan, a group, a community, a people. More than ever do we need new eyes with which to see the world, and an energized effort to help others see that and more. More than ever do I believe the synagogue is the vehicle through which we can see the world, our community, our families and ourselves; those elements we encounter every day, those scenes we have seen every day, the sameness we embrace every day, anew, different, more colorful, vibrant and exciting. The synagogue is the place to try on our lives again, for the first time. Temple Shalom is such a place.

Contrary to the old joke, Temple activity and Judaism do not actually hibernate for the summer. If you have watched your email, or checked out the bulletin or the Temple's website, you know there are plenty of social activities going on all summer long. Shabbat services continue to draw in anywhere from sixty to one hundred people each Friday night. That's all well and good, but I'd like to share with you what is going on at Temple that you may never notice, but we should be shouting from the mountain top!

We provide eleemosynary assistance year round. Are you aware that twice a month fifteen or so congregants volunteer and work with ten individuals with dementia, playing games, helping with art projects, singing, and participating in other activities with these individuals? It is called Caregivers' Day Out, and if you'd like more information, read the article on page 9 of this newsletter or contact <u>caregiversdayout@templeshalomdallas.org</u>. Between ten and fifteen congregants also gather to volunteer at The Bridge, where they serve approximately 400 meals to the homeless in one hour. To learn more, contact <u>stewpot@templeshalomdallas.org</u>. The Stewpot is currently looking for a volunteer driver. Volunteers prepare a meal in the Temple's kitchen to serve approximately 600 people, and the driver is responsible for delivering the food to The Stewpot, another homeless shelter in Dallas.

Caring Congregation is the committee for our congregants that works with other congregants in times of need, when a family member is seriously ill, or there is a death in the family. Dallas Area Interfaith is an interdenominational group working together as one to learn about and work with local, national, and international issues affecting all communities. These are just a few of the activities going on year round that any congregant can volunteer and participate in once or as often as you'd like. Tikkun Olam is not an annual activity that we think about only at Yom Kippur, Thanksgiving, or around December 25; we are commanded to perform mitzvot and, at Temple Shalom, we make it a practice to offer such opportunities every week. It is our job to repair the world and, at Temple Shalom, there is a way for everyone to do so. Ombudsperson

If a congregant feels he/she was not given a fair opportunity or disagrees with a decision made by a committee, the staff, religious school, or anyone else at Temple Shalom, the ombudsperson is available to help appeal such a decision to the Temple Executive Committee or the Board.

President, he is familiar with the Temple and its workings. This is not to say you cannot bring issues or concerns to the Temple President **or any other board member**, but, depending on the issue, they may work with you to utilize the ombudsperson to streamline the process and have your concerns addressed faster. No congregant should ever feel that any one person has the final "no" without the ability to still have someone else hear that congregant's side.



Which of your activities at Temple fulfills you the most or makes you feel the most connected to Judaism or your Jewish identity? Easily the greatest connection comes from leading the morning minyan on Shabbat. I have been leading it for a little over a year and it has helped me to connect with my Judaism in a very profound way. Every week I walk down the long hall to the Epstein Chapel and I feel like pinching myself. It is such a huge honor that people allow me to teach Torah.

If you were the Rabbi or President of the Congregation, what is the one thing you would like to see at Temple Shalom that we currently don't have, do or participate in? First, let me say that I would be a benevolent dictator. At least for a while. The thing that I believe is missing in Judaism is what Christians might refer to as evangelism! Incessant proselytizing is annoying, but, if you saw a good movie, you would invite your friends. I believe we've gone too far the other way. There are people who believe you have to have a ticket to get into a synagogue and learn about Judaism. And, they believe that you can't get a ticket if you're not Jewish. As "Hillel" Bill Hoffpauer has said, we have the greatest product and we keep it behind the counter. If I were supreme leader (I like the sound of that), I would propose a marketing campaign.

Thank you, Ray, for being our 1st Spotlight Congregant. Any final words or thoughts? I am so grateful for the opportunities that I have had here at Temple Shalom. To the parents who trust me to teach their children how to lead a service. To the people who trust me to lead them in prayer on Shabbat. To Rabbi Paley, who believes in me more than I believe in myself. And to my entire Temple Shalom family. Thank you! I love each and every one of you very much.

Caregiver's Day Out

Two years ago, while helping care for her cousin who had Alzheimer's disease, Temple Shalom, Dallas congregant Barbara Glazer had an idea. Knowing from the inside out how difficult it was

for family caregivers of dementia patients to have time for themselves, she thought: Why can't our congregation organize a Caregiver's Day Out?

She approached Rabbi Andrew Marc Paley, who loved the idea and offered the temple's learning center as a venue. The Dallas Alzheimer's Association trained the volunteer caregivers. Glazer

then publicized the initiative through temple channels, asking for volunteers who would be open to caring for early stage Alzheimer's or dementia patients for four hours twice a month. Fifteen people aged 40-75, male and female, Jewish and non-Jewish, signed up.

These days, two Thursdays a month, from 10:30am to 2:30pm, 15 volunteers spend time with up to 10 individuals with dementia-one volunteer being a friend for each participant, with "floater" volunteers on hand as needed.

Glazer explains that "The experience begins with everyone visiting together around a large table having coffee and a snack, looking at books and old Life magazines, and spelling words with Scrabble tiles. Next up is a fun exercise class: We sit in a circle and laugh as a professional trainer leads us in exercise, ending with the passing of two balls around a circle-one color in one direction and another color in the opposite direction-which is challenging for the volunteers, too. Then we walk around

the temple, talking about the artwork in the halls and 'window shopping' in the gift shop. At noon the Corner Bakery delivers a delicious lunch free to the participants (volunteers bring their own). Afterwards, we do hands-on art

Lewis. "It is a fabulous experience for the people with dementia, in many cases the only time they leave their home. Equally important, it is a blessing to give overworked caregivers a block of time to do what they need and want to

do for themselves. They are always telling the volunteers how appreciative they are."

Glazer adds that "My greatest joy would be for there to be a program like ours in every temple in North America. The need is that great."

projects with tactile materials such as feathers, leaves, and lace, which trigger memories that participants and volunteers share with one another. Next, a Therapy Dog visits; most participants have had or still have a dog at home, and the energy and love between the visiting dog and the participant is palpable. Then everyone sings old songs and shares memories. At least once a month, volunteer professional musicians-pianists, saxophonists, guitarists, harpists-put on a concert. We finish our day playing Bingo, with chocolate candy prizes."

Glazer notes that "Music touches people with memory issues like nothing else. One participant, a Holocaust survivor, sometimes 'zones out.' One day when he was 'off somewhere,' a pianist began playing 'Yerushalayim Shel Zahav'-and he immediately joined in, singing loudly and beautifully. There was not a dry eye in the room."

Mother and Daughter Reflect Celebrating Ten Minutes of Torah on Going to Kutz

As the URJ Kutz Camp enters its 50th year, campers emerge as members of a vast network of Kutz alumni. For a select few of those campers, the alumni network includes their parents, also products of NFTY's campus for Reform Jewish teens. Emma Eichelbaum (Kutz '12-'14) and her mom Julie Hollander Eichelbaum (Kutz '80 and '81) are guintessential examples of generational involvement in NFTY, URJ Camps, and Reform Jewish Life. Following are some cross-generational reflections of Emma and Julie, and their thoughts on growing as leaders at Kutz. (This article originally appeared July 8, 2014.)

Emma: Being a second-generation camper at the URJ Kutz Camp is different from being a second-generation camper at any other URJ camp. It wasn't our parents or its geographic location that brought me or my mom to Kutz, but our involvement in Reform Jewish leadership. My mother went to Kutz in 1980 as a leader of her Temple Youth Group, and again in 1981 as a member of the NFTY Social Action Network. The Program Room still features a picture of her with her fellow Kutz Campers, displayed prominently for the camp community to see. I was elected to my regional board as a high school junior and had my first experience at Kutz as a participant at Mechina, NFTY's regional leadership preparation event. It was there, with the rest of the NFTY General Board, that I first saw my then-17-year-old mother smiling in that picture, giving me a connection to this new camp and youth group experience. No matter the board position, for both of us Kutz was a camping match made in heaven.

Julie: NFTY and Kutz were life-altering experiences for me. The lessons I learned honed my leadership skills, enhanced my Judaism, built life-long friendships, and helped me mature and become independent. NFTY reinforced what my parents modeled for me my entire life. Being part of the Jewish community is to be an active participant. Overnight camp as a youngster provides an introduction to Jewish life away from your parents, but Kutz solidifies your role. I have grown to be involved in temple life and leadership ever since.

Emma: Kutz is a place where I can be 100 percent myself. Every summer I've spent there I've learned more about Judaism and myself. I feel in touch with my faith, and the network of amazing Jews I have found at NFTY's headquarters is invaluable. In my summer as an Avodah, I worked with the Kutz Kids Club and met so many of the visiting faculty—one of the best parts of the job. I can say I've met the current generation now leading our movement, and am a member of the thriving generation of leaders to come. Thank goodness my mother had such an amazing summer in 1980; it's because of her that I was convinced to stay at Kutz for a full session in the first place. When I miss her over the summer, it's nice that I can go down to the program room to see her smiling face in that photo, which reminds me of how special this place is to both of us.

Julie: I still remember the Sunday morning at religious school when my mother dressed up in a Katy Kangaroo costume to drive membership. She was the Temple Kol Ami youth group advisor in West Bloomfield, Michigan in 1978, my first year. My parents' support of my involvement in youth group was unwavering. When the opportunity came to get on an airplane to go to summer camp, it was a big deal back then. Without hesitating they made the investment in my Judaism and me. How satisfied they would be to know that their commitment has continued through their grandchildren.

Emma: We both posed for pictures beside the exact same willow trees by the exact same lake. We trekked the exact same hill up to sleep in the exact same bunk. We both ate in the exact same dining hall with two generations of Jewish teenagers that made the exact same impact on our lives.

Julie: From my parents, to me and to my children, NFTY has been there. And having my children experience that magic and love it as I had is just incredible. I truly believe that NFTY and Kutz are what will carry Reform Judaism into the future.

Julie Hollander Eichelbaum resides in Plano, Texas and is a member of the Temple Shalom community in Dallas. She previously served Temple Shalom as Sisterhood president and a Board of Trustees' member, and taught religious school for the Next Dor high school program, of which she was a founder. She has also served as youth group advisor, and is a proud mother to three wonderful NFTYites.

Emma Eichelbaum is a rising sophomore at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas. Becoming a Rabbi

Why a Rabbi?

I first realized I wanted to be a rabbi as a young child, well before I became bar mitzvah. It began innocently enough, part of a long string of answers to the question, "What do you want to be when you grow up?" that included pizza delivery service and professional baseball player. Yet, as my respect

and admiration grew for my family's rabbi, Rabbi David Cohen, I began to think more seriously about becoming a rabbi. When my mother fell ill and Rabbi Cohen was there for my family throughout her illness, I realized that I, too, wanted to help people find comfort in Jewish tradition. My family was deeply committed to Judaism, but not very observant. My connection to Judaism grew as my parents encouraged me to read Jewish books and seek out educational opportunities through my high school youth group, BBYO. I continued by choosing majors in Hebrew and Jewish Studies in college, and applied to HUC-JIR because it was the rabbinical school for someone like me, someone who did not come from an observant home but who had a voracious appetite for meaningful Jewish learning.

My Education

My Jewish education began in Hebrew school at my synagogue and from learning from my parents and grandparents. Around bar mitzvah age, I began reading popular Jewish books, works by rabbis like Harold Kushner, Harold Schulweis, and Joseph Telushkin. I continued my Jewish learning during my undergraduate studies. I loved the rigorous and scholarly learning I received in this academic setting, yet my courses sometimes lacked a certain feeling of *kedushah* (holiness) in the staunchly secular academic setting. At Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR), I found the opportunity to learn in an environment every bit as rigorous and scholarly as any great university, but with a sense of connection to *k'lal Yisrael* (all of Israel) and a sense that this learning had a deeper meaning.

As I Look Forward

As a newly ordained rabbi who has completed 5 years of study at HUC-JIR, two daunting tasks stand before me. The first is to continue my studies and to maintain a sense of rigor and commitment to learning without the benefit of supportive faculty, challenging coursework, and resources like the Klau Library. The second is to bring all that I have learned and all I will continue to learn to a congregation comprised of different ages and backgrounds and to make Torah speak to each and every one of them. Fortunately, I acquired the tools to continue my learning, made relationships with faculty and staff that will last throughout my career, and developed a network of supportive rabbinical colleagues and mentors to guide me through the process.
