I WAS JUST THINKING...



In 1996, in only my 2nd year as a rabbi, I was asked to spearhead a project to create a High Holy Day prayer book that could be used by the congregation, one that would really be a book and not feel like some paperback throw-away. I set to work and a few months later created "N'siyat HaNefesh – A Journey of the Soul: A Prayer Book for Families for the High Holy Days". It was modeled after a prayer book used at a Reform congregation in White Plains, New York. I was very proud of it and it was very well received. I was then asked to undertake the effort to create a new prayer book for Weekdays, Shabbat and the Festivals. This would prove to be a much more involved project.

And involved it was. The committee and I worked for the better part of four years before we were able, in 2000, to produce "N'siyat HaNefesh – A Journey of the Soul for Shabbat". I was and still am very proud of that effort. So proud, in fact, that as I completed this task, I sent a copy for review to the then URJ President Rabbi Eric Yoffie. I still have the letter where he commended me on my effort and said the CCAR prayer book committee (which was just beginning their efforts to create *Mishkan Tefilah*, the prayer book we currently use) should just use mine and be done! The congregation continued to use that prayer book until this August – a 17 year run. Not bad!

Prayer, liturgy and worship have always been an important part of my rabbinate and a critical part of my spirit life. That is why the commitment to valuing historic norms of practice and at the same time exploring current trends in music, poetry experiences in worship are so valuable. And that is why Temple Shalom has continued to be a part of that combination of old and new as we on-boarded a new prayer book shortly after I started - *Mishkan Tefilah* - and now, beginning this Rosh Hashanah will begin using a new High Holy Day prayer book – *Mishkan HaNefesh*.

This new High Holy Day prayer book has been generously and lovingly made possible by so many in our congregation in honor and celebration of my 13th year of service to Temple Shalom. I am truly humbled by the outpouring of support and the enthusiasm with which this gift has been realized. It is especially meaningful to me given my

love for liturgy and to have another chance to welcome another prayer book into our midst. I cannot thank you enough for your gift of love to the congregation and for your celebrating with me not only for these past 13 years, but for the love and support you have shown my family. Thank you! Thank You! Thank you!

I would also like to thank Debbi Sorrentino and Ken Parker for their efforts in making this gift possible. Their love for prayer, for communal worship and for things of the spirit is only matched by their true love for Temple Shalom! Thank you! Thank you! Thank you!

You should also know that our prayer books for Shabbat – *Mishkan Tefilah* – being used so often, can easily fall into disrepair. Sometimes the binding comes loose, or pages are torn or some combination. A damaged prayer book is like a member of the family; when it is in need of some assistance,

we don't throw it out, we try to fix it. And, for those prayer books that needed fixing (and there were many!), Temple Shalom came to the rescue in the form of Anita Corenblith and her crew of dedicated prayer book patchers! These dedicated souls literally glued and dabbed and q-tipped and rubber banded all the books that needed repair back to life. It was a delicate and tedious effort that took many, many weeks. Thank you! Thank you! Thank you! We will be able to enjoy those books for many years to come! Thank you for saving them!

The truth is that, when it comes to Jewish life, it was always understood that you needed a few critical things: candlesticks, a kiddush cup, a challah cover, a Tallis and a prayer book. Those were your basic Jewish components of your Jewish insurance policy. Prayer and prayer books, especially, held the key to a meaningful Jewish life. It was within its pages that centuries of joy and exultation, hope for the future, meaning in the chaos around us, could all be expressed and to which we, as Jews anywhere in the world, could all connect at almost the same time and almost in the same way, using almost the same words and, to some degree, some familiar melodies. Nothing connects us better and for the chance to connect better and deeper in this most beautiful way, on this most humbling of occasions, I again thank you from the deepest part of my heart.

They closely resemble the style of our Shabbat prayer book, *Mishkan Tefilah*, so, in that regard they will feel familiar.

Due to the change in the prayer books, there will be more musical changes than we've had in previous years. The creativity in these new books allows us to be equally creative with the music, while keeping the favorites that everyone looks forward to during our Days of Awe.

We are so pleased to have Dr. Jonathan Palant returning as Choir Director and Mary Medrick returning as Accompanist. We are blessed to have these fabulous talents at Temple Shalom.

We will have the amazing Yuri Anshelevich as our cellist for our Kol Nidre service once again. Yuri and Mary will be playing for the Music and Meditation Program on Yom Kippur. This program will give you an opportunity to sit in contemplation and meditation as you listen to spiritually moving music.

I received a Bachelors of Music from Northwestern University. I studied vocal performance there. I am now studying to become a Cantor at The Academy for Jewish Religion.

So you are studying to be a Cantor! What's your favorite Jewish song?

That's a tough one! I don't know if I have just one favorite so here are a few... "Wherever you go" by Larry Milder, "Im ein ani li mi li" by Debbie Friedman, and "Shalom Rav" by Alan Weiner.

What is your favorite type of food?

My favorite dish is the risotto I cook with my husband. It takes a lot of time and effort but is so delicious and is such a nice time to spend together.

What do you enjoy doing when not working at Temple Shalom?

I enjoy watching the West Wing with my wonderful husband, Willie Wrinkle, playing with my dogs, and cooking.

What excites you about working with Temple Shalom youth?

I love bringing joy into learning and Jewish experience. That is something very exciting for me about this year.

Judaism 101 – classes begin Saturday, October 7 9:00am-10:15am – Boardroom


This class requires a minimum of 10 students



Did you know:

- **Every \$1 = 3 meals.** 94 cents of every dollar donated goes directly to programs fighting hunger, with only 6 cents going towards administrative/fundraising expenses.
- More than **853,000 people in NTFB's 13-county service area are food insecure** - that's **1 in every 6 people**.
- **One in every four children** in North Texas is food insecure (more than 300,000 children).
- **Only 9% of the individuals we serve are homeless.** Hunger affects not only the unemployed, but those who are under-employed. These individuals are food-insecure: **95% of households served by the NTFB have an annual household income of \$30,000 or less.**
- **The North Texas Food Bank provides access to nearly 190,000 nutritious meals a day.** Although that number is great, there is a need for nearly 300,000 nutritious meals a day to feed hungry people in North Texas.

A message from the Worship Chair: High Holy Days Honors

Over the years, many members have asked about the process of identifying and assigning Honors for the High Holy Day services. The Clergy identify the moments in the service for the placement of the Honors and most, if not all, of the Honors are assigned by the Senior Rabbi and the Temple President. If assigned an Honor, you will receive a letter or email from the Senior Rabbi's office notifying you of the Honor and requesting your quick response of acceptance.

Putting the High Holy Day service together is much more than just identifying prayers or songs (especially this year when we will be introducing a new prayer book – *Mishkan HaNefesh*). There is an ebb and flow to the service, and your participation through an assigned Honor not only helps move the services forward but provides an opportunity for the congregation to not only reward you for your time and effort but to recognize your commitment to the Temple Shalom community.

Everyone understands that not all of the Honors are equal; however, there is no such thing as a small honor. Additionally, some Honors require extraordinary eloquence and some Honors require prior knowledge of Hebrew. Please feel free to communicate to the Rabbi's office that you are pleased with the Honor but unable to accept if you are uncomfortable speaking in front of a large audience, feel that your Hebrew may need some work, or you will not be available to attend services. However, it is not appropriate to request different and/or specific Honors in exchange for an assigned Honor. And, most important, it is both respectful and necessary that you respond quickly to the Rabbi's office with your decision.

I hope that this helps explain the purpose and process for the selection of Honors. Please understand that with a congregation of our size, not everyone can be provided an Honor. Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions about this information.


