We concluded with an exercise titled, "What kind of Jewish leader do you want to be?" involving introspection, reflection and self-evaluation.

Overall, it is clear that our clergy, staff and lay-leaders are committed to making Temple Shalom a warm, energetic place to worship, learn and interact with friends. We are committed to making Temple Shalom a place we are proud to be and a synagogue – a holy community – where we want others to share the wonderful experiences we are having.

Rabbi Menahem Mendel of Kotzk (1787-1859) once said, "If you truly wish your children to study Torah, study it yourself in their presence. They will follow your example. Otherwise, they will not study Torah themselves, but will simply instruct their children to do so."




