I Was Just Thinking...



The story is told of Abraham, our great Patriarch, being chosen by God to be the first one to understand that there is, in fact, One God. But, what was so great about him? Why him? The Torah gives no clues. As a matter of fact, the story we read about him in this week's portion has him attending to guests that arrive at his tent. Again, while it is a nice and important

gesture, there is still no clue given as to why God picked him. A few verses later we are told that God has a plan for Sodom and Gomorrah. Must God tell Abraham the plan? After all, God says Abraham will be the father of a great nation whereby all the other nations will be blessed. And, here we finally have a clue. The juxtaposition between the story of welcoming the three strangers and God telling us that Abraham will be the source of national pride and worldly example is the key. To become a great and respected nation one must first be the place of welcome and protection. It was true for Abraham and it is true for us as well.

This very ideal, that there could be a place, as Emma Lazarus' poem so aptly captures, where the tired and the huddled masses yearning to breathe free can go, is, in part, the ideal that so many brave men and women of our country have served to uphold. This ideal, that America is a place of welcome and hospitality, is one worth defending and promoting. While we

might not always be great at it all the time, throughout time, we still believe it to be possible and find value in making sure this and other American ideals are defended and kept secure.

We live in a scary and tempestuous time. More than ever have our ideals been shaken to their core. More than ever are there those who seek to put an end to that which we hold dear. More than ever are we thankful to those who continue to make sure that our freedoms and our way of life are protected. There are not enough thank-yous to be given to express our heartfelt gratitude to those who have served our country and who, through their bravery and valor, sought to be the ambassadors of freedom, safety and security we need to be able to be the kind of people who can welcome, embrace and care. Our night in commemorating Veterans Day, is one small act of thanks in this regard. I wish it could be more.

Many Americans mistakenly believe that Veterans Day is the day America sets aside to honor American military personnel who died in battle or as a result of wounds sustained from combat. That's not quite true. Memorial Day is the day set aside to honor America's war dead. Veterans Day, on the other hand, honors *ALL* American veterans, both living and dead. In fact, Veterans Day is largely intended to thank *LIVING* veterans for dedicated and loyal service to their country. November 11th of each year is the day that we ensure veterans know that we

deeply appreciate the sacrifices they have made in their lives to keep our country free.

To commemorate the ending of the "Great War" (World War I), an "unknown soldier" was buried in highest place of honor in both England and France (in England, Westminster Abbey; in France, the Arc de Triomphe). These ceremonies took place on November 11th, celebrating the ending of World War I hostilities at 11 a.m., November 11, 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month). This day became known internationally as "Armistice Day." In 1921, the United States of America followed France and England by laying to rest the remains of a World War I American soldier -- his name "known but to God" -- on a Virginia hillside overlooking the city of Washington D.C. and the Potomac River. This site became known as the "Tomb of the Unknown Soldier," and today is called the "Tomb of the Unknowns." Located in Arlington National Cemetery, the tomb symbolizes dignity and reverence for the American veteran.

In America, November 11th officially became known as Armistice Day through an act of Congress in 1926. It wasn't until 12 years later, through a similar act, that Armistice Day became

a national holiday. The entire world thought that World War I was the "war to end all wars." Had this been true, the holiday might still be called Armistice Day today. That dream was shattered in 1939 when World War II broke out in Europe. More than 400,000 American service members died during that horrific war. In 1947, Raymond Weeks of Birmingham, Alabama, organized a "Veterans Day" parade on

November 11th to honor all of America's veterans for their loyal and dedicated service. Shortly thereafter, Congressman Edward H. Rees (Kansas) introduced legislation to change the name of Armistice Day to Veterans Day in order to honor all veterans who have served the United States in all wars.

In 1954, President Eisenhower signed a bill proclaiming November 11th as Veterans Day and called upon Americans everywhere to rededicate themselves to the cause of peace. He issued a Presidential Order directing the head of the Veterans Administration (now called the Department of Veterans Affairs) to form a Veterans Day National Committee to organize and oversee the national observance of Veterans Day.

Our observance of Veterans Day includes the singing of the anthems of each of the 5 service branches; Coast Guard, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Army. Please join us as we honor our veterans at our Shabbat service Friday, November 13, 2015. Please join our salute all those for their service and dedication to our country.

A Note from Cantor Devorah Avery



In a couple of weeks, we will commemorate Kristallnacht, which occurred on November 9 - 10, 1938 in Nazi Germany and Austria, (Austria was part of Germany at that time). It is hard to believe it was only 77 years ago.

My Uncle Fred, Alfred Bieler, has always been one of my favorite people. He passed away a few years ago. Uncle Fred was gentle, kind, and soft-spoken. Fred was born in Austria and moved to the United States in the 50s. He, my Aunt Freda, and cousins Jack and Carole, lived in Houston, TX where he owned a pawn shop. Fred was a music collector. He had thousands of albums of music – opera, classical, and jazz. I felt a strong connection to him because of our mutual love for music. My favorite memories from my visits to Houston are sitting with my Uncle Fred in his music room, (a room filled wall-to-wall and floor-to-ceiling with record albums), and listening to music. He had a ritual of sitting in the music room every Sunday and listening to music all day. As much as I love music, I've never had that kind of discipline.



I grew up with great stories about my family and their escape from Ukraine to Romania and finally to the United States. My Uncle Fred, husband of my father's sister, Freda, had his own remarkable story – the full depths of which I only came to know after his passing. This is an excerpt from my uncle's obituary:

"His family left Austria in 1938, the day before Kristallnacht, having been warned by friends. He traveled to Paris with his stepmother, and the family was briefly reunited before the war. When France fell, he was sent south to Perigeux, but his father was turned over to the Nazis and most of his relatives were wiped out. Young and with red-headed European looks, he joined the Underground and was sent looking for places to hide Jewish children. These included a stone quarry, an abbey, and an insane asylum. In Lyons, he was placed with the military police, where he created documents to smuggle Jews out of Europe. Fred had plenty of chutzpah, and recollected once making small talk in perfect German with Gestapo officers. Fred didn't talk much about the war, never thinking anyone would be interested."

These last few years, I've been thinking a lot about his kindness and about his courage. Would I, under the same circumstances he was under in France, a red-headed Jew

with European looks, have done the same things he did? Would I have helped smuggle Jews out of Europe, would I have helped hide Jewish children? I like to think I would. I hope I would.

I've heard people speak about our country's apathy. We are in a time when people don't speak out as aggressively or as passionately as they once did. Maybe we're not as unhappy with the injustices we face daily. Maybe we are too exhausted, busy being a nation of workaholics. Maybe we are too afraid to speak up outside our comfort zones. Maybe we are too overwhelmed by the injustices we see and are frozen, not knowing where to lend a hand. Maybe we don't worry about the rest of the world, as long as our family is happy and healthy. Or, maybe things aren't so bad after all.

I don't believe we are living in a more peaceful time than those people in the 30s and 40s. I actually think we are living in a more dangerous time simply because we think things are better. It's more dangerous because there is more silence in the face of injustice. Misogyny, bigotry, persecution, ignorance, and intolerance are rampant in our country and around the world. We know that there are people, not just in the United States and Israel, but in all countries who suffer, who are being exploited, and who are falsely imprisoned – often accused of crimes they themselves are the victims of. What do we do about it? What *can* we do about it? I certainly don't have all the answers, but here's what I think we can do:

Care.

Care about others. Care about our world and our planet and all life that inhabits it. Care so much that you get angry whenever you hear about injustice. Care so much that you are moved to action.

I think as a society, at a certain point in our lives, we are expected to simply turn off certain feelings. In some ways it makes sense, if we are consumed on a daily basis with the weight of the pain of others, how do we function? How do we even breathe? I think the key is not to turn off those feelings, but instead to feel them and let those feelings guide us to righteousness.

Think of our sages who believe that the teachings of the Torah can be pared down to these few words from Parashat K'doshim: *V'ahavta l'reacha kamocho*, Love thy neighbor as you love yourself. If we truly love each other and believe we are all made in the image of God, then we know it's time to step up. We know we have to put an end to our apathy. It's not up to any one of us to heal the world, but we must each do our part. I think of my Uncle Fred. He did not single-handedly bring an end to the war, but he made a difference in the lives of the people he helped save. In that way, Alfred Bieler was a hero.

May we all strive to be heroes in the lives of those in need. May it lead us to peace.

Invite Someone for Dinner



One of the great things about Temple is the relationships one can build. Whether through youth group, religious school, Brotherhood or Sisterhood, Shalom Silver, Young Adults, Young Families, or any of the groups we offer, there are always opportunities to meet new people that can become part of your social network (not only in the social media sense). You can also meet people each Friday night at services, or on Sunday mornings (many people hang around while their children are in Sunday School). Davening and Dining is another open setting in which you can join and meet a group of people over a casual dinner. You could also get involved through Havurah, where you can be matched with a group of people that have similar interests.

Many of us are already involved, while others have recently moved to town, joined the synagogue, and do not know many people yet. We have all experienced being “the new kid on the block” before; at times it can feel awkward trying to meet people. Having been a member of Temple Shalom for over 25 years, I still do not know all our congregants.

Jewish tradition includes hospitality (*haknusat orchim*). It is a mitzvah to show hospitality to the stranger. Abraham invited the three wanderers to relax while he brings them water and food (Gen. 18). Rebecca graciously watered the travelers’ thirsty camels (and met Isaac) (Gen. 24). We open our doors at the Seder on Passover with an invitation to the hungry and needy. We read in the Hagadah, “Whosoever is in need let him come and eat” (Ta’anit 20b). Our congregation has held a Second Seder for the exact purpose of inviting not just congregants but opening it to the community so that strangers will have a place to celebrate Passover.

So now, the challenge: Meet someone new this year. Invite a congregant whom you do not know to join you for dinner. Our clergy ask us each Friday night to say hello to someone you do not know, and I am challenging you to take this greeting one step further and actually spend an evening getting to know a congregant you do not really know. This is a “social mitzvah challenge.” We will also be hosting a special “New Members Only Big Block of Cheese” gathering to meet them and to tell them about everything going on at Temple Shalom. Let’s make everyone at Temple Shalom feel part of our wonderful community.

Religious school has gotten off to a wonderful start. Kids can be heard laughing, playing and, if you listen closely, even learning! We started off the year with a variety of fun activities, including a Spirit Day in which children, teachers and Ozrim dressed up in Temple Shalom "Blue and White". Later in October, our 1st grade families had a fabulous Family Ed Day with a special visit from our Sofer on-Site. We learned all about how Torahs are written and the multitude of special laws that a

scribe must follow. Following the Sofer's visit, 1st grade families had an opportunity to create their very own family Torah scrapbook made up of their family's photos and written memories.

Our Kindergarten, 1st and 2nd grade students have met their brand new *Hands on Hebrew* specialists and have already learned how to introduce themselves, identify all the parts of the classroom, and even speak the Hebrew names for farm animals. 


The Witch Hunts and the Jews

The European witch hunts (1420s-late 17th century) saw the prosecution of 100,000 people for witchcraft, including diabolical witchcraft - meeting with the Devil (usually at Sabbats), signing a pact with the Evil One, and subsequently working harmful magic in a revolt that aimed to topple Christian civilization. Medieval Christian linkage of Jews to the Devil led to the on-going demonization of Jews in art, literature, laws, and persecution that continued through the witch hunts to Nazi Germany and to the current Middle East.





What Would You Do if This Happened to You?

CASE 1: Your spouse/partner dies one year before your planned retirement. Son loses job shortly thereafter. His wife is so ill she cannot work. The two teen-aged kids are living through this. You are now paying their mortgage and healthcare costs. You have become their safety net. Will there be any retirement in your future?

CASE 2: Spouse has Alzheimer's and you are his /her full-time caretaker. You have found part-time help but you really need a full-time continuum of care facility. You have cut your work hours in order to care for him /her. But you cannot afford full-time care. Your children are concerned but live out of town. You do not have the resources to enlist the kind of help you really need and feel stressed and very lonely.

CASE 3: You married your college sweetheart. You have both worked during the time the 3 kids have been growing up. You have always saved some but just can't seem to get ahead. Prices for necessities keep going up, your in-laws need caring for, and climbing college costs are a very scary thought at this time.

CASE 4: You work and have health insurance through your employer. However, the price for your spouse/partner is unaffordable at \$700 per dependent per month.

CASE 5: You have a chronic disease that requires that you take several medications. Increases in insurance rates have climbed to the point that you cannot afford your medications.


