I love our sanctuary. The colors. The soaring ceiling. The simplicity of decoration. I love the Ark and the sculpture and the windows that allow us to bring a little bit of the outside into our sacred space. I chuckle at seeing everyone watch the crows bump into the windows and how they have an uncanny knack for doing that right in the middle of my sermon!

Sanctuary is a special place for many people for many reasons and I am honored to do my work in such a beautiful space.

The word sanctuary is a word derived from the Latin word sancti - meaning holy and arium - meaning a container for keeping something in. Therefore, a sanctuarium, or

sanctuary was a sacred object, a consecrated thing or place

meant for holiness or safety, or, to put it in more of a modern sense, a sanctuary was always a safe zone, a safe concept, a safe place. It is where we go when we need quiet, a place for reflection, a place of welcome, a place of prayer, a place of blessing, a place of learning, a place of connecting with God.

But, sanctuary wasn't always just about prayer. There are animal sanctuaries, plant sanctuaries. There is also a concept of legal sanctuary which can mean a place of refuge. In

early English Common Law, the church was a place where fugitives could go and where they were immune from arrest. This practice ended in the 17th century in a legal sense, but some churches still offer sanctuary even though it carries no legal authority. Legal sanctuary can also mean political sanctuary – immunity from arrest afforded by a sovereign authority. This is more commonly known as seeking political asylum.

Since the earliest of times, people seeking a safe place from the tyranny and oppression they experienced sought sanctuary – sought sacred places that allowed them the right of practicing their religion, spared them from racial bias, protected them against ethnic violence, and provided them with a shelter that allowed them to live their lives as God intended them to.

This has been the story of the Jewish people since the days of Abraham and Sarah who, as journeyers, sought God's blessing and protection in the Land of Israel, the ultimate sanctuary of the Jewish people. In the months leading up to WWII, those Jews aboard the St. Louis were denied sanctuary – in Cuba, in Canada, in the U.S. and then sent back to Germany where many died in the death camps. This is why we are always called upon to remember that we were strangers in a strange land and to never allow what happened to us, to happen to anyone else – ever.

The idea of extending the boundary of sanctuary beyond the Temple to cities began in 1979 when the city of Los Angeles instituted a police policy that prevented officers from inquiring about the immigration status of those they arrested. Los Angeles became the first "Sanctuary City". Currently there are over 200 cities across the country that have selfdesignated as sanctuary cities which, by the way, has no legal standing but was meant to make a point that sanctuary needs to be taken seriously.

In 1983, the National Safe Place Network of Louisville, Kentucky was founded to provide access to immediate help and support for children and adolescents who were at risk or in crises. Safespace.org explains that a safe place is a place where anyone can relax and be fully self-expressed, without fear of being made to feel uncomfortable, unwelcomed or challenged on account of biological sex, race/ethnicity, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, or cultural

> background. As of today, there are more than 20,000 Safe Places across the country. The idea that sanctuary needs to be extended beyond the Temple, Church or Mosque has clearly become a welcomed addition in the service of others.

Which brings us back to our sanctuary -- our place of shalom. I believe we at Temple Shalom pride ourselves on being both a sanctuary and a place of shalom – places where God's sanctity can be felt and expressed and where people feel peace,

wholeness and completeness. I believe we have a Jewish responsibility as people commanded to listen to God's words, to provide this sanctuary to whomever walks through our doors seeking the pathway to a life of safety, meaning, beauty and God's presence. We will love our neighbor as we love ourselves and we will not stand idly blind to the plight of others as they seek the sanctuary they need. Let us be the place of welcome, so different from so many other places. As our prayer book, *Mishkan T'filah* says so powerfully, may we live this every day.

"May the door of this synagogue be wide enough to receive all who hunger for love, all who are lonely for friendship. May it welcome all who have cares to unburden, thanks to express, hopes to nurture. May the door of this synagogue be narrow enough to shut out pettiness and pride, envy and enmity. May its threshold be no stumbling block to young or straying feet. May it be too high to admit complacency, selfishness and harshness. May this synagogue be, for all who enter, the doorway to a richer and more meaningful life."

A Note from Cantor Devorah Avery



Pushing Boundaries and Overcoming Fears

Right now I know many of us are experiencing fear and uncertainty about the coming days, months, and years. My hope and prayer for all of us, including myself, is that we won't allow our fears to get in our way. This is a personal story of overcoming fears.

Six years ago, I had the opportunity to take part in something extraordinary. September 12, 2010, I participated in the Hudson River Swim For Life. The Hudson River Swim is a three-mile swim across the Hudson River. I did my training through Team-in-Training and raised over \$1,500 for the Leukemia Lymphoma Society. Starting in late March and continuing all through the summer, I spent 3-4 days a week at the pool swimming laps. I started out slow, only swimming about 10 laps my first few times in the pool.

One day, after gliding steadily through my laps, a woman in my lane mentioned the swim to me. After hearing all the details and learning that I would be helping raise money for the Leukemia Lymphoma Society, I knew it was something I had to do. Slowly, slowly, I kept adding on more laps each time I swam, until I was up to half a mile, and eventually working my way up to a mile. On Sunday mornings in July and August, we swam as a team in the Hudson River. The first time we went to the river we swam a mile, then a mile and a half, then 2 miles, and finally, we came to the day of the swim, preparing to make the daunting three-mile swim from Nyack to Sleepy Hollow right alongside the Tappan Zee Bridge.

Swimming is something I started when I was a kid at camp at the Tulsa JCC. I joined the swim team in the summers and occasionally won a medal. In High School, I was on the swim team for about two years. While I enjoyed the competition, what I got most out of the races was shaving a couple seconds off my own time at each meet. I was absolutely not one of the best swimmers on the team, but I wasn't near the bottom rung, either. I was just an average swimmer, and that was fine with me, as long as I could continue to challenge myself to swim a little faster each time I was in the pool.

After High School, I stopped swimming and really didn't get back in the pool very often. This was in part due to insecurities and self-image issues and also due to an inability to prioritize exercise as something valuable and necessary in my life. I finally went back to swimming six years ago because I knew I needed to continue to find ways to be healthy and to release the stressors of everyday life.

I learned many things about myself through the experience of training for this swim. One of the very first things I noticed was an incredible feeling of inner calm and a sense of well-being after each dip in the pool. Swimming gives me a kind of spiritual experience, another opportunity to feel close to God. I also learned that, despite what I considered my limitations to be, I am strong and athletic. Like many, I have the tendency to let my fears and insecurities get in the way of my life. Though I wanted to swim and get back in the pool for years, I wasn't able to get my mind out of the way long enough to actually get wet.

Every week out in the water, I felt stronger and more confident. Every time I swam with the team in the river, I came out feeling exhilarated. Despite these wonderful feelings, for a couple of weeks leading up to the Hudson River Swim, I really struggled with my fears. So many times I asked myself, "How can <u>I</u> do this?"

The day of the swim came. Honestly, I don't know how I made it into the river with so many hundreds of people. Though the river looked calm and glassy that morning, before approaching the midway point, I found myself fighting very strong currents. For what felt like hours, but was probably closer to 45 minutes, I was caught in a current that kept pushing me away from where I needed to go. Though I was swimming with everything I had in me, I was getting no closer. Eventually, the coast guard came and picked me up, along with many other swimmers. They took us in part of the way, past the worst of the current and then we were let back out into the water to complete the race. After finishing the swim, I felt amazing and immensely proud. Though I was slightly disappointed at not being able to swim directly across the water, I learned later that somewhere around half the swimmers were brought in by boats at least part of the way, if not all the way, because of the strength of the currents.

Fears encourage separateness. They keep us inside ourselves and take us away from others. This secular New Year, instead of making a resolution, I am going to continue to ask God to help me recognize my fears and for help with not letting them control me. I believe that if we can all continue to slowly work towards recognizing, accepting, and finally facing or letting go of our fears, we can step out of them into a place where we will be more available to be of service to those in need. If we can do that, we will be that much closer to being true partners with God in *tikkun olam*, repairing the world.

Ford or Chevy?



Our lives are full of choices. These choices are often insignificant, but sometimes they are life altering. The process of selection is fascinating to me. What factors are reviewed when a person chooses one item or service or place over another? What drives customer loyalty to a particular brand? Do you drink Pepsi versus Coke? Do you fly American over Delta? Do you prefer Starbucks to Dunkin' Donuts? Does the idea of a Chevy over a Ford truck seem insane (we are in Texas so how do I not include a pickup reference)?

The reason we stay loyal to particular brands is generally a function of the core values and guiding principles of the organization. When value sets come together to create a quality service or product <u>and</u> an exceptional customer experience, people keep coming back. In fact, it goes beyond just the return customer. Brand loyal people become apostles (sorry, I couldn't think of a better word) and tell everyone they know to frequent the company in question.

For example, let's take a look at Patagonia. Patagonia is a company that sells winter athletic wear such as fleece jackets. Patagonia's mission, however, isn't to be the highest grossing company in its market. Rather, their purpose is to *"build the best product, cause no unnecessary harm, use business to inspire and implement solutions to the environmental crisis"*. In line with their mission, they give generously to organizations focused on bettering the environment and are ecologically responsible. They purposefully design clothing that will last as long as possible. They sell clothes, yet, because of their mission, they actually don't want you to come back every year to replace your article of clothing. If the clothes last, they don't end up in a landfill. As a result of their "green" values, the company has a loyal, almost cultish, following of consumers that will only buy Patagonia.

The mission of Temple Shalom is "to inspire in our congregation an enduring relationship with God, Torah, Israel, and the Jewish people through worship, study, gathering and community service". This mission is intended to unequivocally state what we believe in and what we exist in the world to accomplish. What our mission doesn't define is who can be a part of our community. This is purposeful, because Temple Shalom strives to be an inviting, open, diverse, and accepting community of Jews and interfaith families. I think our openness, our warmth, our diversity, and our commitment to social justice is what separates us from all other congregations in the area. This is our brand promise and our value proposition. Now it is up to all of us to deliver on our promise and create an exceptional experience for all who come through our doors. To quote author Jeffery Gitomer, "You don't earn loyalty in a day. You earn loyalty day-by-day."

Just as the Ford driver can never imagine purchasing a Chevy, or the Patagonia loyalist can never imagine buying a North Face jacket, it is my hope that none of us will ever be able to imagine worshipping anywhere else but Temple Shalom.

As Hanukkah approaches, our kids have two things on their mind: gifts and jelly donuts. Sure, these are wonderful parts of the holiday, and there is nothing wrong with us getting excited about them; but, what I am wondering about is how many of us actually take the time to think about the meaning of Hanukkah, beyond the gifts and donuts? How many of us reflect on the miracle of the oil and the victory of the Maccabees? How many of us use Hanukkah as an opportunity to think about the miracles in our lives? How many of us take time on this holiday to be grateful for religious freedom and prosperity? While I am confident that most of us have the gift giving and donut eating part down, I wonder if we can consciously improve our Hanukkah experience by

adding in some more meaningful discussions and actions.

Over the last couple of months, in preparation for this article, I have spoken to Jewish families around the country about their unique Hanukkah rituals. I will share a few of them here:

- In order to emphasize the story of the Maccabees and ensure that their children really know the story and meaning behind Hanukkah, each night, after lighting candles, the Cohen family reads a part of the Hanukkah story. Mr. Cohen makes sure to end each night at a good part so that the kids are excited to hear what comes next. As the kids are getting older, they are remembering more of the story and make guesses about what part comes next. Because the children love Passover and the telling of the Exodus story, the Cohens decided to bring the ritual of storytelling into their home and enhance their Hanukkah tradition with it.
- Because the Solomon family felt that their kids were missing the miracle element of Hanukkah, they decided to dedicate time each night after opening presents to discuss the daily miracles in their lives. They explained to their children that daily miracles were specific things from their day that they were grateful for. According to Mrs. Solomon, their kids enjoyed this evening ritual so much that they have extended it past Hanukkah and now make it a weekly Shabbat dinner discussion.
- The Greenberg family was looking for a change to their Hanukkah ritual of lighting candles and opening presents each night and decided to dedicate the 4th and 8th night of Hanukkah to gift giving, rather than gift receiving. On these nights, instead of their kids getting presents, they participated in family mitzvah projects. Before Hanukkah, Mr. and Mrs. Greenberg give the children a list of mitzvah projects to choose from and the kids each get to choose one. Over the years, the projects have included: making and delivering PB&J sandwiches to the homeless, visiting and playing with the dogs at the humane society, picking up trash in their local park, and making no sew blankets for the local shelter. The family plans to continue the tradition for many years to come!

If you, too, feel like your family could use some Hanukkah enhancement, feel free to borrow one of these rituals I listed above! Wishing you and your family a warm and festive holiday!

Temple Shalom Opposes BDS Movement

In connection with Temple Shalom's commitment to our Jewish homeland – Israel, the Statement that follows is Temple Shalom's official Position Statement unanimously adopted by the Temple Board of Directors on behalf of Temple Shalom.

In compliance with the dictates of this Position Statement that Temple Shalom develop "specific actions" to oppose the BDS movements, the Temple Shalom Israel Connection Committee is pleased to trumpet to the entire congregation the following "specific actions" that it has implemented to date on behalf of our Temple, with additional actions in the planning stage. They are as follows:

- (1) The 2016 Israel Today Community Symposium in which panel discussions and lecture sessions
 (i) addressed the dangers of the BDS movements and (ii) presented many strategies for countering BDS in the schools and colleges, in the business community, and in the state and federal legislative bodies.
- (2) In connection with the anti-BDS bill to be submitted to the Texas Legislature in the upcoming 2017 legislative session, the Committee has conveyed Temple Shalom's support for the bill to Representative Phil King, who will be the principal author of the bill, and has also arranged for volunteer legal and personnel assistance.

Temple Shalom, founded in 1965, is a Reform Jewish Congregation located in Dallas, Texas. Over the past 50 years, Temple Shalom has maintained an informed connection with the State of Israel through, among other actions, the travel of its members and their families to Israel and/or by their participation in Temple Shalom's many educational programs focused on Israel and her issues. Indeed, Temple Shalom's very Mission Statement explicitly directs the Temple to inspire in its congregation an enduring relationship with Israel.

Temple Shalom stands for the proposition that the State of Israel has the unqualified right to exist as a Jewish and democratic state, and it accordingly supports a strong U.S. – Israel relationship as one that mutually benefits the United States and Israel. Thus, neither Israel, the survivor of our ancient homeland, nor its survival, should ever be threatened by any person or any entity. Israel is, without question, America's closest ally in the Middle East due, in large part, not only because of its strategic location, but because it shares our American freedoms and democratic values. Thus, Temple Shalom does, and will always, support the existence of the State of Israel, even when it may not necessarily endorse every action taken by her, any more than it does for any other country, including the United States of America.

There is an underlying immorality of those who are opposed to Israel's very existence. For this reason, as well as its unyielding support for Israel, Temple Shalom hereby emphatically denounces and pronounces its intention to take specific actions to oppose, the various Boycott, Divestment, and Sanction (BDS) movements that exist today. These movements are not only based upon intellectually dishonest fabrications of the facts, but many are merely cover-ups for the real objectives of elimination of the State of Israel and the expansion of anti-Semitism. Therefore, specific actions to oppose the BDS movement will be developed by Temple Shalom during the year, consistent with its Mission Statement, the U.S. Constitution, and the Rule of Law.

Some of you may have noticed that this year, for the first time, recycling was offered at Food Truck Palooza! This is just one of numerous ways Temple Shalom is taking steps to reduce our environmental impact. Other examples include:

- Single stream recycling is available throughout our building, which means that bottles, cans, clean paper, and plastics (all but #6) can all go in our blue recycling bins.
- Heating and AC are only turned on in spaces that are being used.
- Outdoor watering is limited to specific high-need areas.
- Our recent renovation includes energy efficient light fixtures, plumbing and window systems, and we are transitioning to energy efficient light bulbs as old ones are replaced.
- We have increased the amount of insulation in our building and use sustainable energy sources whenever possible.

Do you have ideas about how we can improve sustainability at Temple Shalom? Please contact Chair Nina Minney at <u>earth@templeshalomdallas.org</u>. Join us at our meetings on Sundays, Dec.11 and Jan. 22 at 9:30am, Boardroom.

As individuals, there are efforts each of us can contribute as Guardians of the Earth. Ideas include:

- Recycle whenever possible! Seek out blue bins in offices and classrooms if you don't see one nearby. Also look for blue bins at events like Food Truck Palooza, especially for cans, which are made of very valuable natural resources. Avoid printing emails and handouts. Instead, keep digital files using online tools, and use projectors to share content electronically in meetings.
- Turn off lights behind you in rooms where switches are not automated, such as religious school classrooms.
- Carpool to and from services, religious school and temple events. Spare the air and get to know your fellow members a little better.
- Opt for reusable items such as coffee mugs, bags and towels, and cut back on these <u>7 Disposable Items That Are</u> <u>Polluting the Planet!</u>

There are many ways to repair the world and one of them is by building bridges of communication, understanding, accepting differences and embracing the fact that we are all in this together.
