I Was Just Thinking...



Torah study on Shabbat is a wonderful opportunity together with friends and our Temple Shalom family for something to eat and something to learn. If there was ever a place where the rabbinic teaching – “...If there is no flour, there is no Torah and without Torah there is no flour” – meaning you can’t learn well on an empty stomach, and Torah provides real nourishment – is lived out, it is Saturday mornings at Temple Shalom. 9:00AM starts the learning. Come a little before and have something to eat!

For the past several months we have been working our way through the Books of the Prophets. It is an amazing book of historical perspectives, prophetic pronouncements, Divine admonitions, and geo-political intrigue. One of the major Prophets, Jeremiah, lived through the destruction of the first Temple and exile by the Babylonians, and knew despite the devastation of the last remnant of the tribe of Judah, that eventually the Jewish people would be reconstituted and would thrive, in the land, once again living in harmony with each other and with God. Speaking directly to the exiles in Babylonia he shares with them not just a command for the moment, but a directive for all of us for all time. He tells them, “...**seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.**” (Jeremiah 29:7). Seek the welfare of the city, and pray to God on its behalf. A truly amazing concept. Wherever you are, make that place livable, care for it, be a part of it. For when it prospers, you will prosper. It is no wonder then, wherever Jews have lived, we have sought the welfare of the city and its inhabitants and tried to make it a better place to live. This is true in the Middle East and it is true here in the U.S. Caring for the place where we live means developing those habits that will allow our democracy to flourish and thrive.

As Parker Palmer wrote, “When Alexis de Tocqueville visited our young nation in the 1830s, and wrote the classic *Democracy in America*, he predicted that democracy’s future would depend heavily on the ‘habits of the heart’ its citizens developed, and on the health of the local venues in which the heart gets formed or deformed: families, neighborhoods, classrooms, congregations, voluntary associations, workplaces, and the various places of public life where ‘the company of strangers’ gathers. These habits and the places where they are shaped form the invisible infrastructure of American democracy on which the quality of our political life depends.” In other words, seeking the welfare of our city, means working WITH each other, not against each other, for the betterment of all. Or as Terry Tempest Williams wrote, “**The human heart is the first home of democracy. It is where we embrace our questions. Can we be equitable? Can we be generous? Can we listen with our whole beings, not just our minds, and offer our attention rather than our opinions? And do we have enough resolve in our hearts to act courageously, relentlessly, without giving up—ever—trusting our fellow citizens to join with us in our determined pursuit of a living democracy?**”

I believe we can and I believe we must. Palmer understands that there are five habits to nurture as we seek the welfare of our city.

1. Understand that we are all in this effort together. Despite our desire for individualism, we are more connected than we realize.
2. Understand and appreciate the value of “otherness”. Not everyone is the same in our city and valuing the differences really matters.
3. Having the ability to hold tensions, without falling apart. Living in the here and now, and believing in a better future is a quintessentially Jewish ability.
4. Having a sense of personal voice and agency. Our thoughts matter and our participation in the process of seeking welfare matters.
5. The capacity to build community. Without each other we have no real city, no real community, no real democracy.

As we continue our efforts **to become an influencer and use our great powers of influence for good** this year, I hope we can think on these habits and others as we seek the welfare of our city and create the kind of community worthy of the Divine blessing we know is possible. I look forward to creating that community with you in this New Year.

I promise this article contains no politics and no Chicago sports talk.

October has arrived, and with it we have the State Fair, football in full swing, baseball coming to a close, and basketball revving up. We also have Sukkot, the harvest festival. Sukkot lasts for eight days, and this year at Temple Shalom it is particularly meaningful, with our garden in full growth and expanding. We began celebrating Sukkot on Saturday, September 30, with our adult “Banquet in Thyme,” a special garden to table meal from our garden. Sunday, October 1 join our all-age celebration of Pizza in the Hut at noon. For details go to Sukkot.

The Temple Shalom Justice Garden works in four action areas - education, ecology, wellness, and food. We help supply food to the homeless. If you have not toured the garden or helped out, it is a tremendous undertaking led by Gretchen Reynolds, Stuart Marcus and Karen Stock, as well as a whole team of volunteers. Every Sunday and Tuesday volunteers meet to work in the garden, and all are welcome.

Our Justice Garden has not only been supported by a federal grant, but we recently were recognized as a Monarch Waystation, certified by Monarch Watch. Monarch Butterflies are a big deal in Texas, so much so, that the first seven days of October are Monarch Butterfly Week, a state designation by the Texas Legislature since 2009. The law even notes, “Through participation in the Texas Monarch Watch program sponsored by the Parks and Wildlife Department, Texas residents and visitors may help scientists answer research questions about monarch biology and migration.” Texas Government Code § 662.153.

Tikkun Olam is obviously a significant value of Judaism, including our own temple values. Our mission statement includes community service as one of the Jewish verbs – the acts that make us the holy community we seek to establish.

Personally, I do not have a green thumb (or if I did it would probably be due to poor circulation). I started growing some fungi in my garden, but it failed miserably. I have mushroom for improvement. I have done my best through trowel and error, but I do not have the thyme to get it right. I welcome anyone’s sage advice. Lettuce always remember it was John Lennon who said, “give peas a chance,” and George Harrison retorted with “My Sweet Gourd.”

Please mark your calendar for a big event at noon on December 10, when we will celebrate the “grand opening” or “ribbon cutting” of our expanded garden along with other festivities. We will have local and federal representatives here to participate, tours of the garden, educational programming about the Justice Garden, and plenty of food! This will be a fun and educational experience for all ages.

Thank you to all our volunteers who have put in their sweat and efforts to make our Justice Garden a tremendous success and continue to help feed those who need food in our community. Our Justice Garden is the Mitzvah that keeps giving. It is time once again to call for nominations for the Temple Shalom Board of Trustees!

Board service is a sacred task not only in the traditional meaning of the word "fiduciary," but in the role trustees undertake in service to and realization of our mission. This is truly meaningful and holy work.

As our Temple Constitution & Bylaws describe, "The Board of Trustees shall be responsible for overseeing the management of the general management of the affairs, activities, funds, records and property of the Congregation," among other duties and responsibilities such as:

- Organizational leadership, governance, and advisement, assuring organization and continuity of the board of trustees, officers, and committees, formulation and oversight of policies and procedures, financial oversight, including development with staff, clergy and lay leaders/budget committee, an annual budget; advocacy for the organization, resource development, including fundraising, outreach and ambassadorship.
- Members of the board share these responsibilities while acting in the interest of Temple Shalom, consistent with our mission, vision, values and a Brit, or covenant of service, created and signed by all trustees each year.

Length of term: Two year terms generally, which may be renewed up to a maximum of **two** consecutive terms (a maximum of four years).

Meetings and time commitment:

- The Board of Trustees generally meets at 7:00pm the first Monday of each month at the Temple. Meetings typically last 2 hours.
- Board members are asked to be active participants in the congregation, to participate as volunteers, to serve on committees, and to attend temple events, be members of their respective auxiliary, as well as take turns attending and serving the congregation at Friday night services as greeters.

Temple Shalom policies provide criteria for service. If you are interested in serving, please contact Debra Levy-Fritts for the criteria information. The application deadline is December 31, 2023.

As we begin the month of October we are halfway through the Jewish month of Tishrei, a month that contains four holidays! It was **wonderful** to see so many of you as we celebrated Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. A special thanks to our **youth choir** and our **7th graders** for helping to lead the family services.

There is a lot happening around the holidays of Sukkot and Simchat Torah as well. Sukkot began Friday night, September 29th with services in the sukkah. When we return to classes on October 1st learners will have the chance to celebrate this **Season of our Rejoicing** as Sukkot is known, by visiting the sukkah, helping to decorate it, and helping harvest foods from our garden, as Sukkot is also a harvest festival. Families are invited to join us after classes on Sunday for our annual family picnic and pesto party: Pizza in the Hut. We will have another chance to do share the **joy** of this holiday and do some decorating, play games, **enjoy** the bounty of our garden harvest, and celebrate together with **friends** in our **kehillah kedoshah**/holy community.

Friday, October 6th begins the holiday of Simchat Torah, **Rejoicing in our Torah**. Our holiday season celebrations will continue with an outdoor service in the courtyard with singing, dancing, and reading the final AND first verses of the Torah. Each year on Simchat Torah we conclude one full cycle of reading the Torah and begin again; a reminder that reading and learning from the Torah never ends. On Sunday, October 8th our learners will have a second chance to hear from the Torah. We will read the final lines from the book of Deuteronomy and then read the story of creation (the first verses of the book of Genesis) all while sitting in our garden and experiencing the **wonder** of God's creation. Parents are invited to join us for this special tefilla/worship at 11:30. Parents are ALWAYS invited to join us for worship every week at 11:30; we are usually in the chapel and more and more you will find us worshipping in the garden!

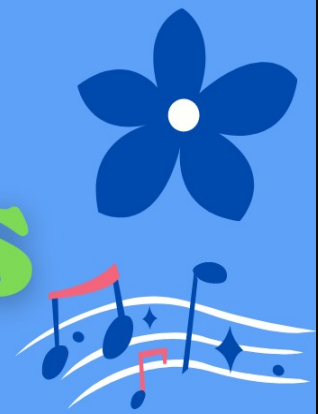
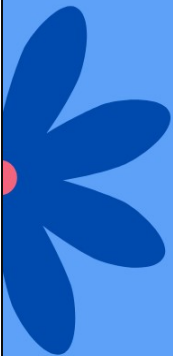

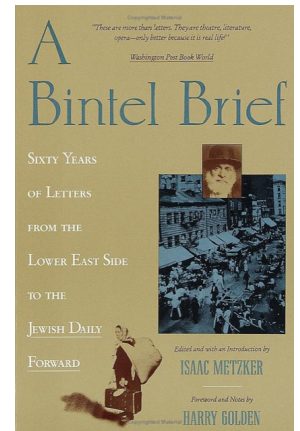

Once a report is made, security agents determine the urgency and, if necessary, work with the FBI or other law enforcement partners. The information from the reports can also be used to keep better data on incidents, learn who is behind the threats, and track cases across communities. People can use their computers, tablets or cell phone to fill out the reports.
