I Was Just Thinking...



The ancient story of Purim, recounted in the biblical Book of Esther, offers profound insights into various aspects of our world today. Despite being a narrative from ancient times, the themes and lessons embedded within the Purim story resonate strongly with contemporary issues and challenges. Here are a few thoughts....

The Perpetuity of Prejudice and Discrimination: At its core, the Purim story revolves around the pervasive presence of prejudice and discrimination. Haman's sinister plot to annihilate the Jewish people stems from his deep-seated bigotry and desire for power. Dear Sophie and Micah:

By the time you are old enough to truly understand the meaning of this letter, the world as I know it may be unrecognizable. My hope for you is that some traditions, remnants, and the history of our people continue to be carried on. The Babylonians, Romans, Egyptian Pharaohs, the Ottoman Empire, the British Empire, Tsarist Russia, and many other similar groups have come and gone. And while many of those empires have persecuted, subjugated, tried to convert, expelled, and even tried to eliminate the Jewish people, each time we have survived.

The Jewish people have endured and remain because we are more than a religion, a belief system; we are a people, a community. Jews care for each other whether they be a family member or a total stranger; if you ever find yourself in a place where you have no connections or friendly faces but are in need, look for the Jews, as they will care for you. Find the closest synagogue, because there you will find people who know that the Jewish community is not just their local community, but the Jewish people throughout the world.

Synagogues in America are the foundation and the lifeblood of what keeps the Jewish people together, and will be the reason Judaism will continue to survive here. JDate and the internet may connect you with Jews, but it is not enough to sustain our community. And while it may not always be what your friends are doing, you need to affiliate; join and support a synagogue. It does not matter if it meets your immediate needs; think of it as insurance for the Jewish community. Be a part of sustaining the people who came before you for the people who will come after you.

I joined Temple Shalom because I loved teaching religious school, and I started Ozrim because I saw the need to raise and train teens to be future religious school teachers. I joined Brotherhood because I liked the friendships I gained and the activities they did like building the Sukkah, providing a Purim Carnival, and playing softball. Your Bubbe joined Sisterhood and served in many roles on the Temple Board and task forces. We both have served on the Temple Board of Trustees. Your family has helped raise money for temple programs and we volunteered our time and money to sustain temple life, investing in our Jewish community at Temple Shalom. And anytime the temple asked us to assist, we have made every effort in any way possible to help maintain and fortify our congregation. That is part of sustaining a Jewish community.

I have had many friends who have enjoyed the benefits of our congregation, raised their children at Temple Shalom, enjoyed Jewish life cycle events at temple, accepted scholarships for their children to go to Jewish camps, but once their children graduated, they decided to leave the Temple Shalom community because they did not see what they were receiving for their membership dues. I do not begrudge these people for wanting to keep that money, but one can still join a synagogue and maintain their finances. Temple Shalom has never rejected a member of the community for an inability to pay dues. And while the money you earn can bring you much joy in vacations and nice cars, it can also bring you much joy and satisfaction in making a difference. What those who left did not understand was their sacred duty to maintain a safe haven, of having a Jewish refuge when you or other Jews need it. Being part of the Jewish community means helping maintain the community even during times when you think it may not benefit you, because God forbid there may be a time when you do need that community's support-- for an illness when the congregation gives you comfort and companionship, or a shiva to mourn with you at a loss, or just a friend to sit with at services. Taking the temple for granted, as if it will always be there if you decide to come back is like believing your plants will be there if you leave for a year-long vacation and you do not continue to water them. One should not take for granted a temple can survive if you do not actively feed it and maintain it.

At temple, your children can learn about our traditions, our beliefs, and our ethics. They will learn how justice is what sustains a civilized world. These teachings, which is what the Torah is, are the link to survival of the Jewish people, but also the world. It is the Jewish tradition of Tikkun Olam, repairing the

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world, that models for the world how to promote peace and unity. By working in the temple garden with others to grow food for those in need of food, together we repair the world one meal at a time.

My hope and prayer for you is that you will carry on these traditions. Be a part of sustaining the Jewish community. Whether it is your time, your money, your wisdom, or better yet all of these things, you can contribute and be a vital part of the link between generations and thus become, in your own right, part of the legacy of the Jewish people. This is *your* community, they will be there for you when you celebrate and when you need comfort, and it is your sacred obligation and your birthright to be a part of maintaining our Jewish community in all ways in which you are able.

I recently heard a d'var Torah that referenced the book <u>Dear God: Children's Letters to God</u> by David Heller. These brief letters, written by children ages 6 to 12 from various religious and cultural backgrounds, emerged from Heller's research on children's religious and moral development. Here is a small sampling:

Dear God: Thank you for my baby brother. But what I really wanted was a puppy. Joyce.

Dear God: Maybe Cain and Abel would not kill each other so much if they each had their own rooms. It works with my brother. Larry.

Dear God: We read in school that Thomas Edison made light. But in Sunday School, they said that you did it. I bet he stole your idea. Donna.

Dear God: I didn't think orange went with purple until I saw the sunset you made on Tuesday. That was cool!



Children can be great teachers of Torah, but they need models of learners, too. This is why we have given the 7th graders, our oldest Sunday learners, the opportunity to lead younger learners. This is why we have Ozrim, teenage helpers, here every week.

And this is why we have learning opportunities for parents.

The Talmud teaches that the children who left Egypt were the first to recognize God. This is a

puzzling statement. What about Moses, Miriam, Aaron Joshua, and all the elders of Israel? The Rabbis argue those were not the first to recognize God, but rather, it was the children born and raised under Egyptian oppression. The Rabbis taught that even during this time of



When we embrace the opportunity to learn through the joy and wonder of the eyes of our children and when we share with them our own experiences of Jewish joy and wonder we can all become imbued with the ability to recognize God, as it says in Pirke Avot 4:1: Ben Zoma said: Who is wise? He who learns from every man, as it is said: "From all who taught me have I gained understanding."



Once a report is made, security agents determine the urgency and, if necessary, work with the FBI or other law enforcement partners. The information from the reports can also be used to keep better data on incidents, learn who is behind the threats, and track cases across communities. People can use their computers, tablets or cell phone to fill out the reports.
