I Was Just Thinking...



As we approach the sacred festival of Passover, commemorating the ancient Israelites' liberation from slavery in Egypt, our hearts are heavy with the plight of the Israeli, U.S. and other nations' hostages, whose freedom hangs in the balance. The juxtaposition of their captivity with the theme of freedom during this time of year brings into sharp focus the enduring struggle for liberty in our world today.

Passover, is a time of reflection and celebration, marking the Exodus from Egypt over three millennia ago. It is a story of resilience, faith, and the relentless pursuit of freedom against all odds. Yet, as we retell the tale of our ancestors' deliverance from bondage, we are acutely aware that the quest for liberation is not confined to the distant past but continues to resonate in our present reality.

Presidential Nu's



There is an old movie you may have seen on Turner Classics called *Little Big Man*. Chief Dan George was nominated for an Oscar for his part as Old Lodge Skins in the film (you may remember him for his commercials for Keep American Beautiful, with a tear down his face). He is an old man in the film. Toward the end he walks with Dustin Hoffman (the star of the film) to a nearby hill, the Indian burial ground, where the old man, dressed in full chief's regalia, has declared, "It is a good day to die," and decides to end his life with dignity. On top of the hill he offers his spirit to the Great Spirit and lies down at his spot at the Indian Burial Ground to wait for death. After a while, it begins to rain. Old Lodge Skins is revealed to still be alive, and says, "Well,

sometimes the magic works. Sometimes it doesn't." They return to his lodge to have dinner.

The same experience occurs with Temple Presidents. Every Temple President has ideas and sometimes they work - sometimes they do not. I want to share one that worked. One of the biggest challenges we faced at the start of this presidency was knowing our long-time and beloved Executive Director, Steve Lewis, was retiring. We were tasked with quickly performing a nationwide search to find a good fit for Temple Shalom.

The position of Temple Executive Director ranks among the most important, yet thankless, jobs in the American economy. Not to be stereotypical, but you may have heard that members of our tribe have a reputation for complaining. Golda Meir and President Nixon were both lamenting their plights as leaders of their countries. Nixon explaining why his job was more difficult, said, "Why? You are the president of 8 million, while I am the president of 180 million." To which Golda is said to have replied, "You are the president of 180 million people, while I am the president of 8 million presidents." Whether it is too hot or too cold in the sanctuary, for every congregant the Executive Director tries to make it colder for one congregant while warmer for the next congregant.

We began a national search and the applicants varied, including a candidate who claims to be an Executive Director/Rabbi/Cantor/teacher/actor. Now such a talent we could use, but the phrase "Jack of all trades, master of none" came to mind. Then we met David Lamden, and clearly he is an example where this time *the magic worked*. (Let me make it clear the magic was performed by the Temple Search Committee, not the author of this article.)

It seems strange to use a word like *Beshert* for an Executive Director, but that may be the perfect term. Through a series of circumstances that benefited Temple Shalom, David became available just when we were looking for someone experienced, interested in living in Texas, personable, and tech savvy (he was the Chair of the National Association of Temple Administrators' Technology Committee). And so far, he has been all that we have hoped for and so much more. David was friends with Steve Lewis, and the two of them worked together to make the transition virtually seamless. We are blessed to have a Temple Administrator as experienced, professional, qualified, and competent as David. We have always had a great professional support team and, while it is not unusual to see staff leaving when there is a change in leadership, David has maintained the core and continued our good fortune of a tight loyal team.

Sure, Arlington brought the Metroplex a championship team (the Renegades), and also that baseball World Series thing. But Temple Shalom brought the Metroplex David Lamden, and let's see who has a longer lasting impact. If you have not yet met the wonderful Mr. David Lamden, please join us on April 19th at a special Friday Night (After Services) Meet & Greet Dessert in David's honor.





This month we celebrate the holiday of Passover, our Festival of Freedom. Passover is the most celebrated Jewish holiday. Each year we are commanded to experience the seder AS IF we ourselves went forth from Egypt. The word seder means order and the 15 steps we do in order during the seder help us to experience AS IF we were being led out from slavery or from a confined and restricted experience to freedom and openness. We may bemoan having to eat different foods, having to sit through a long meal, all the set-up and clean-up this holiday requires (and maybe many other things), but if we give ourselves the time to think about why and how each of these is hard, we might experience some of the AS IF of our history of slavery and being confined in Egypt. If we think about these

elements with a lens of appreciation, perhaps we can think about the **joy** our Israelite ancestors experienced in being set free and finally leaving Egypt.



Once a report is made, security agents determine the urgency and, if necessary, work with the FBI or other law enforcement partners. The information from the reports can also be used to keep better data on incidents, learn who is behind the threats, and track cases across communities. 


About the Event:

As the Nazis attacked and occupied countries across Europe, they looted cultural and religious items and pilfered property from Jewish communities. By the end of the war, the Reich had carried out one of the greatest mass thefts in human history. Much of this stolen property was trapped behind the Iron Curtain, out of reach to those who sought to restore it to Jewish survivors and their heirs. The World Jewish Restitution Organization (WJRO) was founded in 1992 to pursue restitution of these materials, as many former communist countries have yet to return this property to its original owners or their heirs, or to offer compensation for these losses. Mark Weitzman, chief operating officer of the WJRO, joins us to discuss the ongoing fight for Holocaust restitution in Central and Eastern Europe and his work to make this happen through advocacy and negotiation.

About the Speaker:

Mark Weitzman is chief operating officer of the World Jewish Restitution Organization. He is the senior member of the official U.S. delegation to the International Holocaust Remembrance Authority (IHRA), where he chaired the Committee on Antisemitism and Holocaust Denial and the Museums and Memorials Working Group. He was the architect of IHRA's adoption of the Working Definition of Antisemitism, which is the first definition of antisemitism with any formal status, and the lead author of IHRA's Working Definition of Holocaust Denial and Distortion. He is the co-editor of the recently published *Routledge History of Antisemitism* (Routledge, 2023) and won a National Jewish Book Award in 2007 for *Antisemitism*, *The Generic Hatred: Essays in Memory of Simon Wiesenthal*.



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
