

# High Holy Days 2024-5785



In the story of Creation, the Torah explains that before God began to create, the world was dark and chaotic, unformed and devoid of any form, dimension or color. Against this backdrop, God began the work of forming something from nothing. God was (and still is) the Original Artist. Each day God created new and beautiful and majestic and vibrant colors, shapes and beings. Despite all the dazzling array of breathtaking designs, God never describes them as beautiful; rather God says of God's own handiwork that was created was "good". And in the end, the masterpiece of creation was "very good". Not great. Not stupendous. Not amazing. It is as

if God was saying to the future human creators, "You will be endowed with great artistic ability, use it to reveal the beauty of this world, use it to build hope for everyone, just as I have done."

The High Holy Days is our time to approach our world as a blank canvas, waiting to be artfully filled with the ingredients for a meaningful, enriching, and hopeful life. Each of us is endowed with this artistic talent, even if we think we are neither an artist nor creative. Each of us is called to use these talents to reveal the real beauty of our world and establish the hope we all need and deserve. Our world needs this artistic work now, perhaps more than ever before.

Our High Holy Day Theme, **"Becoming an Artist: Revealing Beauty, Building Hope,"** will be our opportunity to explore how we can become the artist our world needs using different aspects of artistry each and every day.

On Erev Rosh Hashanah, we will explore "**The Art of Curiosity**" and how this God-given talent can be used to grow and mature and deepen and not be used to confine, to frighten or minimize ourselves or others.

On Rosh Hashanah Morning, using the power of curiosity to discover the many blessings surrounding us, we will be more confident using **"The Art of Seeing"** to really appreciate the majesty of others around us and the breathtaking scope of new ideas, new concepts and new possibilities.

Kol Nidre, a time dedicated to asking for forgiveness, is the ideal moment to explore more carefully and more deeply about **"The Art of Asking"** and the skill to ask for what we need, what we want and to inquire about the same ideas of others in our families, in our communities, our country and our world.

On Yom Kippur Morning when we are fully immersed in the imaginative world of what could be, it is necessary to articulate the ideas and ideals of that world God deemed "very good" and to wield our powerful art brush adding the final element, **"The Art of Creating Good"**. With these four key artistic abilities woven together, we can collectively reveal God's beautiful world and, at the same time, build a world girded by hope and crowned with blessing.

# Music for Our High Holy Days

We are so thrilled to join our voices with theirs and make the beautiful music that has become a hallmark of our holiday worship experience.

Last year, Rabbi Paley so beautifully took us on a journey of what it means to be an influencer, and that has been a recurring theme all throughout this year. As we enter a new year, he will be sharing with us what it means to be an artist. While we immediately think, *Being an artist! A painter! A sculptor! A pianist! A singer!* it goes even deeper than that. What does it mean to be good or to do good? What does it mean to create meaningful conversations to build understanding and learning? Those are ways of becoming an artist in our world too!

In the Torah, we find two different words for creation. The first, *borei*, is what only God can do, create something out of nothing. We find it in the first sentence of Genesis: *B'reishit bara Elohim...*And the second, *yotzer*, is sometimes translated as to form or to fashion. It is creating something from something else, to form what is already there. That is what we humans can do. When thinking of what it means to be an artist, we can immediately think of *Ki Hinei Kachomer* that we read during this season, that we are but clay in the hands of a potter. Yet, for this particular potter, we are partners in the act of *yotzer*, of forming and fashioning the world to be a better place. We read from the *Mishna, Eilu D'varim*, "These are the things that are limitless...the study of Torah is equal to them all because it leads to them all." We cling to our Tree of Life that enriches our creativity to help form the world into a better place.

We are so fortunate here at Temple Shalom because our community is so rich and full of artists who create every single day. Let's continue to lean into our artistry and strive to bring out the best in ourselves and each other. Wishing you a beautiful L'shanah Tovah!


### S'lichot Service

In the opening verse of the Creation story in Genesis, we read that the canvas of the world was not blank nor without substance. Indeed the Torah tells us that it was dark, unformed, with a Godly presence hovering above a foreboding deep. It was only when God began the creative process that the chaos and darkness was transformed into order, beauty and blessing. In fact, so impressed with God's own artistic handiwork, that at the end of creating, God calls the masterpiece of creation as a whole, "...very good".

Throughout our High Holy Days we have explored the ideas, lessons and expressions of our own human abilities of "Becoming an Artist". Welding our God-given, God-imitating talents of curiosity, seeing, asking and creating good, will change the canvas of our world from something dark and chaotic, into something good and holy and beautiful. Please join Rabbi Paley as we welcome **The Rev. R. Casey Shobe, D.Min., Rector for the Episcopal Church of the Transfiguration**, for a conversation about art, artists and the ability we all have to reveal beauty and build hope in our world.

### High Holy Days Ticket Policy 2024–5785

- All 8:00pm and 10:00am services require a ticket for adults.
- Children and grandchildren of members, ages 18 and under, may accompany their parents and grandparents to services without a ticket.
- College students may use their Student ID Card in lieu of a ticket.
- Military personnel may use proper identification if not in uniform.
- Adult children (of members) under the age of 26, who are not students, may be issued a ticket upon request.

### TICKETS WHICH WILL BE MAILED ON SEPTEMBER 9 ARE NOT TRANSFERABLE AND ARE FOR THE USE OF MEMBERS ONLY.

#### **SECURITY & PARKING PERSONNEL**

#### PARKING

To enter the Temple Shalom parking area, a "TSD" decal must be visible on your car windshield. Parking is on a first-come, first-served basis. Temple members needing a new TSD sticker should contact the Temple.

#### **BUILDING ENTRANCES**

Entry into the Temple will be at the Main Entrance on the north side of the building, and at the entrance on the south side. Other entrances, including the Lifelong Learning entrance on the east side, will be closed.

#### USHERS

Ushers will be located both inside and outside the Temple, providing assistance and helping provide the best experience for all congregants. Thank you for following their directions.

Please note that children who are attending services in the Sanctuary must sit with their families. Those third grade and younger must be escorted by an adult to the restrooms.

#### FIREARMS POLICY

Guns and firearms are prohibited on Temple Shalom property, other than those guns or firearms held by those hired for the security and safety of Temple Shalom as well as active duty military personnel, sworn peace officers or court officers in the discharge of official duties.
