I Was Just Thinking ...



Shanah Tovah to you and yours!

There seems to be both an urgency and a sadness as I hear myself share those words -Shanah Tovah! - May this new year of 5785 be a good one. On the precipice of another year and the anniversary of Israel's ongoing war with Hamas and Hezbollah, we pray with all our hearts that this will be the year - the good year - the year of peace and quiet and healing we so desperately need.

I have been reflecting a lot this year about the various trips to Israel I have been fortunate to experience, from my very first one in the summer of 1990, to this past one in December of 2023. The words of the 12th century poet Yehuda HaLevi ring loudly for me

and perhaps for you as well, "...my heart is in the East, and I am at the edge of the West". What is Israel in this new dynamic, this unfolding tragic time? Is she still the same? Has she changed?

For me, Israel, was and is best exemplified in the verse from their declaration of independence, which reads, "The State of Israel... will foster the development of the country for the benefit of all its inhabitants; it will be based on freedom, justice and peace as envisaged by the prophets of Israel; it will ensure complete equality of social and political rights to all its inhabitants irrespective of religion, race or sex; it will guarantee freedom of religion, conscience, language, education and culture; it will safeguard the Holy Places of all religions...."

Israel, for me, was always the embodiment of the prophetic dream – just like it says – a place, "...based on freedom and justice and peace" for everyone.

In a world where that isn't happening, I always dream that Israel could actually be that place and manifest those distinctly Jewish values – for real – every day. It nurtures for me a hope that our Jewish story and the Jewish people are really that Or I'goyim – the light unto the nations – that our world so desperately needs. It is maddening and frustrating when she isn't; when her policies and practices distance her from that prophetic dream, and when the evil forces around her rain terror down upon her and attempt to defeat her indomitable spirit. Israel for me is Hatikvah – the Hope - the singular hope in our world for God's blessing and presence – and one that is, as her anthem so beautifully captures "… not yet lost; the hope of two thousand years, to be a free nation in our own land, the land of Zion and Jerusalem.

In this threshold moment in time, as the Jewish community holds its breath and prays simultaneously for a good year and an end to war and violence, I think of Yehuda Amichai's poem, "The Place where We Are Right":

"From the place where we are right Flowers will never grow In the spring.
The place where we are right Is hard and trampled Like a yard. But doubts and loves
Dig up the world Like a mole, a plow.
And a whisper will be heard in the place Where the ruined House once stood."

When I dream of standing at The Wall, I pray for doubts and loves and whispers to be not only a mole or a plow digging up our world, but the loud clarion calls for peace and possibility; I pray for doubts and loves and whispers to water the land cleansing it from millennia of bloodshed and hatred; I pray for doubts and loves and whispers to be the building blocks of a "Makom El Shadai" – a place of the God strength who dwells in the hearts of its sons and daughters. I pray for doubts and loves and whispers and I pray I don't ever have to pray for those again.

May all of us have a sweet, prosperous, healthy, safe and shalom-filled new year.

Dear Temple Family,

As we approach the Days of Awe, my heart has been drawn to the significance of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, which this year bookend the one-year anniversary of the tragic Hamas attack on October 7th. This anniversary weighs heavily on us all. I grieve for the lives lost and for the hostages who remain separated from their families during these sacred days.

The High Holy Days are our most profound time of prayer, and we come together to ask God for compassion and mercy—for the hostages, their families, our community, the State of Israel, and the world. On Rosh Hashanah, the Book of Life is opened, and

on Yom Kippur, it is sealed. This year, we fervently pray that each hostage is inscribed in the Book of Life and returned swiftly and safely to their loved ones.

As we gather in prayer, let us also take a moment to remember those whose lives were so cruelly taken. We will honor their memory with the recitation of Kaddish on October 7th and Yizkor on Yom Kippur, keeping them close in our hearts.

I struggled for weeks to find the right words for this article, knowing I needed to acknowledge this painful anniversary. In what felt like a sign, I received an email from the Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR), which included a poem by Rabbi Karyn D. Kedar, Rabbi Emeritus of B'nai Jehoshua Beth Elohim in Deerfield, Illinois. Titled *"El Malei Rachamim"* (Merciful God), after the traditional Jewish memorial prayer, Rabbi Kedar's words poignantly express the sorrow and hope we carry in our hearts. Here is her poem:

El Malei Rachamim

In blessed memory of you

hiding in the fields and bushes,

and the joggers out for a run,

and the moms and dads making breakfast for their toddlers in their kitchens. and the parents in their safe rooms, holding the door handles for hours, and the babies—innocent infants—and the grandfathers, and the grandmothers, and entire families, parents watching their children die, children watching their parents, and entire neighborhoods of young adults who were waiting to begin their lives. and you, the brave, throwing hand grenades back out of the shelters without doors over and over and over and over and over and over and over again. and you, the courageous, who ran towards the carnage to save who you could over again, and you who were trapped in hundreds of incinerated cars, and the fathers who frantically drove from the north to find their children who cried, Abba, they are near, and I've been shot, find me, and the friends who escaped but returned to rescue their friends and were killed. and you who were raped and maimed and mutilated. and you, who danced as the sun rose and will never see another sunrise and never dance again, and the hostages stolen, beaten, tortured, starved, kept in dark tunnels and family homes, and killed cruelly in captivity, and the young women who stood guard on the towers over Gaza and who watched from screens in darkened rooms showing us, warning us, and were ignored, and were slaughtered, and the civilian guard who held the line to the last bullet without help for hours, and the brave police who fought to the end, and the superheroes of the Israel Defense Forces. valiant, brave lions of Judah...

Your lives were brutally taken on October 7, 2023, and in the relentless aftermath. El malei rachmim, have compassion upon your souls, El malei rachmim, have compassion upon our broken hearts.

As we recite the prayers of these sacred days, let us hold the words of this poem close, allowing them to guide our communal and personal reflections. May our prayers for the hostages' safe return be answered, and may the memories of those we've lost strengthen our resolve to be builders of peace, hope, and strength in the year ahead.

Each month, we will be introducing you to the members of the Temple Shalom Board of Trustees. Each of them will be telling us about their personal Jewish Journey.



My Jewish journey is fairly straightforward – I am a third generation American Jew. My grandparents' families came to the United States in the late 1800s. Dad's side from Vilna and Mom's from the Austro-Hungarian Empire. Three of my four grandparents were born in the United States and one came here when she was a small child. The families settled on the Lower East Side of Manhattan and in Brooklyn. Jewish life started at birth at Maimonides Hospital in Brooklyn.

My father grew up in Brooklyn in the apartment over his father's pharmacy. I loved visiting my grandfather's store, especially the soda fountain that was part of every old-fashioned pharmacy. My mom was also born in Brooklyn but grew up on Long Island. Each parent had large extended families within a several mile radius.

Family gatherings for holidays and good deli lunches were a big part of my journey.

While still an infant, we left New York. Childhood was in Baltimore where we had no family but lots of Jewish neighbors and classmates. The concept of being a minority did not register for me. We joined Oheb Shalom (meaning Lovers of Peace), a Reform congregation started in the 1850s. Fun fact: Oheb Shalom's first spiritual leader was Rabbi Benjamin Szold whose daughter, Henrietta Szold, founded Hadassah in 1912. I loved going to Friday night services, looked forward to the Oneg afterwards, then "Saturday" school the next day. I was studying to become a Bat Mitzvah.

We moved to Pittsburgh when I was eleven and joined Rodef Shalom. My understanding is that Rodef was not doing Bar or Bat Mitzvah at that time as those were considered too traditional. A few years later, our family moved to a conservative congregation, Tree of Life, where my younger siblings could become B'nai Mitzvah and where I was confirmed. The services were not as interesting to me and I spent most of the High Holy Days hanging out in the ladies room with my friends.

After college I moved back to New York, then to Los Angeles. I took for granted how easy it was to be Jewish there. Young adult life included ethnically Jewish life but nothing religious. Moving to Dallas was quite the shock. I encountered people who had never met anyone Jewish before. I sought out the Jewish community joining the JCC and working on Federation events, which is where I met my husband, Steve. Fast forward... we have three daughters who all grew up at Temple Shalom, stayed for Next *Dor*, were Ozrim, found best friends and formed strong Jewish identities. Temple Shalom has been the perfect community for us. We got involved, forged friendships, joined a havurah. We celebrate mitzvot and holidays with other families, creating our modern version of an extended family. I hope Temple Shalom can be your home away from home too.

My maternal grandparents, Abe Viner and Anna Epsten, were born in Philadelphia, PA, and St. Joe, MO, respectively, while my paternal grandparents, Sam Brown (name courtesy of Ellis Island) and Jenny Chernikoff, both emigrated from Russia early in the 1900's before settling in Kansas City. My parents, Nathan Brown and Ruth Viner, were born in Kansas City and Tulsa, respectively, married in 1943, while Dad was in the Army. When discharged, Dad began working with Zale's Jewelers which resulted in semi-regular moves from Tulsa, to San Antonio, where I was born, back to Tulsa, then to Wichita and to Colorado Springs, where I became a Bar Mitzvah (and finished high school).

My Bar Mitzvah was memorable for it being celebrated on a Friday the 13th, with 13 becoming and remaining my lucky number, as well as Grandma Brown lamenting how much spaghetti I had for dinner – "You should be too nervous to eat!" I remember learning my Haftorah with help from a 78-speed record and Rabbi Bergman officiating at Temple Beth El in Colorado Springs. Of interest, in 1971, Temple Beth El merged with the B'nai Israel Congregation and became, and remains, Temple Shalom – you can go home again.

While at the University of Pennsylvania, I was a member of Phi Epsilon Pi fraternity, though it was a time when fraternities were deemphasized. Phi Ep redefined itself as an "eating club" – 3940 Spruce, the house's location in Philly. After four years at Penn and law school at Texas, I located in San Antonio becoming an Assistant District Attorney, thanks to a connection with Jules Sterling, the only Jewish lawyer working for the Bexar County D.A.

My parents had relocated to San Antonio by this time and were members at Temple Beth El, and I became a member as well. Doing so was a blessing, as I made multiple friends through Temple activities, including the B'nai B'rith Bowling League and, perhaps most serendipitously, the Temple Beth El Softball Team. On that team was Stanley Blend, a lawyer at the local firm of Oppenheimer, Rosenberg, Kelleher & Wheatley, who let me know his firm was looking for a young litigation attorney.

I worked with the firm until 1990, including a fair number of matters for Southwest Airlines. On Good Friday, April 13, 1990, Herb Kelleher – who had taken a "leave of absence" from the firm in 1982 to find the "right person" to lead Southwest Airlines – made me the proverbial "offer you can't refuse" to work directly for SWA. I was blessed to work with the People of Southwest for 30 years, before retiring in 2020.

When we moved to Dallas (Plano) in 1990, we split the High Holy Days between Temple Emanu-El and Temple Shalom. Temple Shalom's environment of community and friendly, welcoming atmosphere reminded us of Temple Beth El, and we've been members ever since. Our son, Jacob, celebrated his Bar Mitzvah in 1996 and daughter Annie, her Bat Mitzvah in 1998.

I was "recruited" for the Temple Board by Lory Kohleriter. Believe it or not, Lory was one of my wife Barbara's Sunday School teachers at Temple Mizpah in Abilene! I'm honored and, again, blessed to be continuing my Jewish Journey as part of the terrific team that is the Temple Shalom Dallas Board.

P.S. I'm on the Brotherhood Board, also. – Please join Brotherhood if you haven't already done so!







<u>OMBUDSMAN</u>

If you have a question, comment, or complaint regarding something at Temple Shalom you logically might raise your issue with Rabbi Paley, President Myers, a member of our Executive Committee, or a staff member. However, if you would like an independent channel to look into your issue then our ombudspersons are the place to go. Our two ombudspersons are Myron Schwitzer and Lory Kohleriter. They each have been members of our temple community for over 50 years and are very knowledgeable about a lot of Temple details. They may be able to give you a response for your issue when you contact them, but, more than likely they will want to research it so they can get back to you with a fully developed response.

History Highlights: Operation LUSTY

During World War II, U.S. intelligence teams played a key role by gathering actionable intelligence, including information on enemy aircraft, weapons, and war-related research. In April 1945, Operation LUSTY ("Luftwaffe Secret Technology") was enacted by the U.S. Army Air Forces with the goal of disarming and collecting German aeronautical equipment and technology for study in the United States. Join Dr. Sara Abosch-Jacobson, the Barbara Rabin chief education officer, and Anne Hanisch, project cataloger, as they share more about Operation LUSTY and its wartime intelligence operations through photographs from the William "Pete" Whaley Family Collection, which feature Major Whaley through his service in the U.S. Army Air Forces' 56th Disarmament Squadron from December 1944 to August 1945.

His work in this regard has not only raised awareness but has also facilitated meaningful change in the way communities address and combat hate.
